Call to Order

The Chair of Senate, Dr Martha C. Piper called the seventh regular meeting of the Okanagan Senate for the 2015/2016 academic year to order at 3:34 pm.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Remarks from the Chair

The President advised that the recent federal budget was very beneficial to universities in Canada. She outlined several key points for senators: first and foremost, \$95 million has been added to budgets of the Federal granting councils; the first non-tied money made available in a decade. She thanked the UBC Okanagan members who visited Ottawa as part of UBC's recent delegation, noting that the combined efforts of many universities has shown positive results. Secondly, Dr Piper noted that there was also some new funding for designated research support

Vol. 2015/16 15/16 - 07 - 1 (a new name of indirect costs of research) in that funding. Thirdly, there is significant funding available for both student financial aid and infrastructure; to that latter point, UBC has submitted a list of priorities, largely around deferred maintenance and needed renovations. Finally, the budget had a substantial commitment towards an innovation agenda for Canada and a commitment to an ongoing review of funding for university research; the President opined that this would be a good initiative to be actively involved with to affect the thinking of how research is funded and what is critical. There has not been a clear national review of research funding in at least a decade and thus this is a tremendous opportunity to push our sense of what should happen amongst the university community.

The President and Deputy Vice-Chancellor then thanked the student senators completing their terms this month for their service to Senate and presented them with certificates of appreciation.

Remarks from the Chancellor

Chancellor Gordon noted that a few weeks prior he issued his 5th message to the community following their last meeting on March 8th where a list of 16 names were agreed upon for further consideration. He advised that there was a strong level of interest in the role and the 16 names represent a diverse group – in terms of geography, gender, ethnicity and background – of excellent candidates. Chancellor Gordon noted requests from some for the identity or specific backgrounds of shortlisted candidates; however, he advised that the Committee agreed – and as noted in the terms of reference set by the Board and Senates – that confidentiality of those names is critical for a successful search. That said, the Committee was sensitive to concerns around this demonstrating a lack of transparency, and thus found it important to set out the reasons for that confidentiality: in the opinion of human resources experts and our search consults, it is the experience of past searches worldwide that requirements to publicise candidate names caused good quality candidates to not wish to be considered as it could compromise their current positions.

The Chancellor further advised that at its next meeting, the Committee intends to shortlist 5 to 7 names, and then meet with each of those candidates in two rounds, with the aim of recommending a final candidate to the Board of Governors by June 30th of this year.

The Chancellor noted two changes to committee membership. Greg Peat has resigned and has been replaced by Celeste Haldane, and Jennifer Berdahl has resigned and will be replaced by Mark McLachlan, a Professor of Chemistry. The Chancellor noted that Professor Berdahl resigned because she felt that the committee was not adequate reflecting the views of faculty, and the Faculty Association has had two recent polls, one a survey of non-confidence in the search committee, and the second a formal vote of non-confidence in the Board of Governors. The Search Committee itself does have confidence in its process, as do the Senators on the Committee. A view expressed is that we haven't learned from past mistakes and thus will repeat them. The Chancellor advised that we did learn from the last search committee and many things have changed. Firstly, we were not well served by the previous search firm. This time, the firm has been selected by the Committee rather than by the Board. Secondly, we are undertaking much more consultations with the communities. Thirdly, we are being a lot more communicative and open, and lastly and most importantly, the profile document's attribute section is key for identifying what we need to see in the next president – key to those is having leadership

experience in a large university, and secondly, whoever is the next president has to have the emotional intelligence and ability to build consensus across the University.

Senator Zhang asked what could be done to regain the confidence of the Faculty Association.

The Chancellor noted that a similar question arose in Vancouver. Since then, the Board issued a letter in response to concerns heard, and more importantly on April 14th the Board has scheduled an open session to talk about Board governance processes. We have invited a variety of groups, including the faculty association, to present their views of Governance. Chancellor Gordon noted that the University's governance system has existed largely as-is for a century and has largely worked, so we need to be careful when changing processes. The new board chair has committed to acting more in public sessions, and making sure that better announcements and documentation is kept.

Senator Wylie noted that the AMS has said that they won't support a recommendation for a new president until a review is completed. Secondly, he asked how many internal vs external candidates were being considered.

The Chancellor replied they were aware of the AMS's position, and secondly, he was not able to speak to the internal vs external divide.

Finally, the Chancellor noted that in the media there were renewed calls for the University to release Arvind Gupta from the confidentiality agreement. The Chancellor noted that the Board has responsibility for the appointment and evaluation of the president, and the confidentiality agreement exists and that Dr Gupta has not agreed to release UBC from that obligation. Even if that was not the case however, the chancellor opined that this would not help the situation; the reality is that the President has resigned and we need to move forward and find a new president.

Remarks from the Deputy Vice-Chancellor

The President noted the recent opera last week, and today's 10 year birthday party for the Okanagan campus. Finally, ground breaking today was for the Wilden home building site built on the work of UBCO engineering and being built by the trade students from Okanagan College.

Academic Building & Resources Committee

The Committee Chair, Dr Daniel Keyes, introduced the item noting that his Committee has been meeting regularly with the administration on budgetary matters throughout this year as the Okanagan campus sub-committee of the Council Budget Committee.

2016 BUDGET

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor noted that this budget was produced collaboratively by our deans, directors, campus executive and a representative of the Council Budget Committee. We have gone back and forth and are presenting a draft today. It will be going forward to the Board of Governors next month in open session. Once approved, the budget will be posted online.

Associate Vice-President Einarson presented the budget after outlining the process. In the fall, UBC went over enrolment projections with the faculties, and then considered various requests beyond those that would be automatic. A budget retreat was held and strategic themes came from that.

Associate Vice-President Einarson then went over the budget framework and strategies, noting that our budget is mostly based on drivers based on student enrolment as well as block funding. He noted that one of our key challenges is that our government grant does not account for any merit increases required by our various employment contracts. That said the budget is planned to be balanced this year, although only \$1.7 million in uncommitted funding was available to try to meet \$2.6 million in requests for new funding.

With regards to revenues, Mr Einarson advised that we were in year 1 of an increase in international tuition. We have conservatively budgeted for having no growth in international student numbers as we aren't sure what at increase in tuition will do for enrolment demand.

Finally, Associate Vice-President Einarson noted that there was a small increase in the contribution to UBCV. We have tried to consolidate that into one line so that we can properly understand how money flowed between campuses. That relationship now seems understood and stable.

Senator Sneg noted that there was a commitment for increased student support for mental health, but that the overall health and wellness budget was going down by 3%.

Associate Vice-President Einerson replied that this was a larger line item and we are hiring a new counsellor.

Senator Oyelese noted that for domestic students the plan seemed to always be a 2% increase every year; is there a plan for a longer term approach to tuition?

Associate Vice-President Einearson said that we know that our costs will go up, and we do have to balance this with what the government will allow in any given year. We do not know what the Government will do and thus we only consider this issue on a year by year basis.

Senator Johnson asked if the 5-year funding comparisons were incremental or actuals, and why contingencies were negative amounts.

Associate Vice-President Einarson replied that we sometimes budget more conservatively by allowing faculties to take a risk but then balance that out internally. Further, one time money that is recouped by centre from non-faculty budgets is listed.

Senator Wylie noted that last year we assumed a 5% increase in domestic students that we didn't make and thus had a shortfall, 2% seems more reasonable this year, but asked how we went from 6% international last year to 0% this year. Finally, last year the Deputy Vice-Chancellor's office budget went down, but there actually wasn't a cut, and we are projecting a \$600,000 cut this year still.

Associate Vice-President Einarson replied that yes, for international tuition we do not know what the effect will be on registration and we wanted to be conservative as it may not materialize. We would love for an increase but don't want to count on that money.

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor noted that in real dollars, the administration budget has shrunk. One area with an increase has been the creation of Vice-Principal Research. For the international tuition, we cannot plan for exchange rates, global situations, etc.

Senator Lalonde asked for clarification on the budget of STAR. What is this?

Dr Barker replied that STAR is a unit run out of the Vice-Principal Research office that supports research in interacting with external organizations and facilitates partnerships. It has been successful in its short existence in collaborating with external organizations. Right now, the budget largely pays for technicians.

Dean Binsted noted that STAR was created with the support of Western Economic Development Canada, donations from the Fipke Foundation, and existing CFI funding.

WINTER SESSION STANDARD ACADEMIC MEETING PATTERN 2016W

The Deputy Registrar noted that the academic schedule was to be changed to allow faculties to have more flexibility and to eliminate university time, which was not a period generally respected by schedulers.

Senator Johnson noted that Senate used to be held during university time and it was difficult to find a time for people to always be able to make it to statutory meetings.

Deputy Registrar Vogt replied that we can adjust faculty schedules, and have tried working with students on their schedules.

Appendix A: Awards Report

New Awards:

Bette Mushta Award for Mature Students in Nursing

A \$6,000 award is offered to a student in the School of Nursing in the Faculty of Health and Social Development at the University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. The award is established in loving memory of Bette Mushta who returned to university as a student in her late 30s. The recipient will be a student in any year of study pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. Preference is given to a student who has been away from post-secondary education for a minimum of 10 years and who demonstrates an assessed financial need. The award is made on the recommendation of the School. (First Award Available in the 2015 Winter Session).

Global Citizenship Award in Nursing

A \$1,000 award is offered by the School of Nursing faculty members to a fourth year student completing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing in the School of Nursing in the Faculty of Health and Social Development at the University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. Preference is given to students who successfully complete a global health practicum either internationally, nationally or in B.C. where communities face health equity challenges. Candidates will be selected based on academic performance, excellence in professional nursing practice, and a reflective written submission. The award is made on the recommendation of the School. (First Award Available in the 2015 Winter Session)

Youth Futures Education Fund Bursary for Youth In Care

Bursaries totaling \$18,000 are offered by the Youth Futures Education Fund held at Vancouver Foundation to provide assistance to students who are currently receiving UBC's Youth Aging Out of Care Tuition Waiver. This includes assistance with living costs, costs associated with educational programs, and/or assistance to meet financial emergencies. Bursaries are awarded, based on need, on the recommendation of Enrolment Services. (First Award Available in the 2015 Winter Session)

Coordinated International Experience Award

Awards valued up to \$1,000 each have been made available by the Faculty of Applied Science for students who have been accepted into the Coordinated International Exchange (CIE) program. The awards are available to third or fourth-year students in the Bachelor of Applied Science program to support their travel expenses. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Applied Science.

Rationale: This award is automatically provided to Applied Science students on both campuses who go on the Coordinated International Exchange (CIE) program and put forward for Senate approval by Enrolment Services.

Dr. Spiro Yannacopoulos International Engineering Student Memorial Award

Awards of \$5,000 each are offered to continuing international undergraduate students in the School of Engineering in the Faculty of Applied Science at the University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. This award is offered in the memory of Dr. Spiro Yannacopoulos and his 10 years of service to the School on Engineering on UBC's Okanagan campus. International students selected for these awards must have completed 30 credits towards their bachelor degree or be entering the second year of their program. Students must demonstrate strong academic achievement and engagement in their faculty, as well as the potential to make a scholarly contribution within their chosen field of study. The scholarships are made on the recommendation of the School of Engineering within the Faculty of Applied Science.

Rationale: The International Student Initiative (ISI) currently awards selected international students on UBC's Okanagan campus within all Faculties with the International Student Faculty Award. In honour and memory of Dr. Spiro Yannacopoulos, the ISI is recommending the creation of a new award, Dr. Spiro Yannacopoulos International Engineering Student Memorial Award. The award would replicate the International Student Faculty Award with the exception that recipients must be students in the Faculty of Applied Science (Okanagan campus). Applied Science students would no longer be eligible for the International Student Faculty Award.

Revised Award:

St Andrew's Anglican Parish (Kelowna) Bursary

A \$500 bursary is offered by the St. Andrew's Anglican Church to an Aboriginal student entering second, third or fourth year of full-time study at the University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus after completion of at least one year of full-time study at the University. The bursary is offered to an Aboriginal student in good academic standing who is in need of financial assistance, with preference for a student from the Okanagan region.

Rationale: The donor prefers a new focus on Aboriginal students.

Re: Nursing Academic Regulations – Clinical Skills Achievement Requirement

A policy on the Clinical Skills Achievement Requirement currently exists within the School of Nursing for students in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs. As it is a significant academic policy, Nursing is proposing to add the policy to the Academic Calendar.

Each nursing lab course has one or two Clinical Skills Tests (CSTs). Students must pass all of the CSTs in a course by achieving a minimum grade of 80% on each CST. Should a student fail a first attempt of a CST, there is an opportunity for remediation.

The Academic Policy Committee has reviewed the proposal and recommends the following to Senate:

Motion: "That the Clinical Skills Achievement Requirement for students in the Bachelor of

Science in Nursing programs be approved."

In the event that a student is unsuccessful (achieves a score less than 80%) on the first attempt of a CST the student will meet with the lab teacher and a learning plan will be developed. The goal of the learning plan will be to assist the student in learning the requisite skill and support the student to pass the CST on the second attempt. If a student is unsuccessful (achieves a score less than 80%) on the second attempt of a CST the student will receive an unsatisfactory rating in the lab course. This will result in the student receiving a failing grade in that nursing course, and the student will not be eligible to progress in the nursing program.

Re: College of Graduate Studies Residency Requirements

The College of Graduate Studies is proposing to revise the Academic Calendar language around Ph.D. residency requirements and to add a statement about residency for master's students.

The revised entry on Ph.D. residency states that students are required to accumulate 24 months of full-time study during their program (rather than "at least two consecutive years") and clarifies that it is to be undertaken on or in the vicinity of campus. Examples of activities that would qualify are given. A statement about waivers of the residency requirement has been added.

There are no explicit residency requirements for master's students yet the currently offered thesis-based programs pedagogically require the students to be present on campus. It is being proposed that a statement be added to the Calendar to clarify this.

The Academic Policy Committee has reviewed the proposals and recommends the following to Senate:

Motion: "That the revised statement on Ph.D. student residency requirements be approved;

and,

That the new statement on master's student residency be approved."

The PhD residency requirement at UBCO calls on doctoral students to focus their attention on their degree program in the proximity of other students, scholars, and scientists, thereby enabling them to acquire the "habits, attitudes, skills, and insights" (CGS, 2005) that are necessary for making the high-quality contributions to scholarship and other professional endeavours that are expected of such students. The residency requirement is intended to sustain a campus culture in which PhD students work closely with established or emerging scholars and scientists, including faculty and other graduate students. The academic experience that is the goal of the residency requirement can be achieved in multiple ways, but requires some degree of physical presence on campus.

The residency requirement for all Ph.D. students registered in programs on the UBC Okanagan campus is a minimum of 24 months of accumulated full-time study at the University from the point of beginning a Ph.D. to its conclusion. Programs have the option to increase the length of this requirement as they may desire as part of their program requirements (upon Senate approval). Full-time study, for the purpose of this requirement, may include activities such as participation in laboratory work,

Students admitted to a doctoral program will normally be expected to spend the equivalent of at least two consecutive years of full-time study at the University. With the approval of the Dean of the College of Graduate Studies, graduate programs may



class-work, comprehensive examination preparation, practicums, dissertation research and writing, or other like scientific and scholarly activities that are undertaken on or in the proximate vicinity of the UBC Okanagan campus, and under the direct supervision of UBC Okanagan faculty as part of the completion of a UBC Okanagan Ph.D. degree program.

Waiver of the residency requirement can be granted only by the Dean of the College of Graduate Studies. Successful applications for such waivers will require a program plan that articulates how the student will satisfy the spirit of the residency requirement in the absence of full-time presence on the UBC Okanagan campus.

– Bachelor of Management (B.Mgt.) revised program

The Faculty of Management is proposing a revised Bachelor of Management program, which will be first offered in September 2017. For specific details, please refer to the attached Executive Summary. The last cohort of the current Bachelor of Management program will start in September 2016; this current program will be phased out over a three-year period as the revised program is phased in. The development of the revised program prompted a review of the information in the Academic Calendar and therefore changes are also being proposed to the Calendar language for the current program.

In the current B.Mgt. program, students predominantly take Management courses in their last two years. The revised program will allow B.Mgt. students to begin taking Management courses earlier in their program. This will also help to solve the current barrier of an oversubscribed third year and enable students to complete elective courses in their third and fourth years.

The Curriculum and Academic Policy Committees have reviewed the material forwarded to them by the Faculty of Management and enclose those proposals they deem ready for approval.

Therefore, the following is recommended to Senate:

Motion: That Senate approve the revisions to the Bachelor of Management program,

including degree requirements, academic regulations, and the associated new

and revised courses effective as of September 2016; and,

That Senate approve the revisions to the Bachelor of Management program, including degree requirements, academic regulations, effective as of September

Executive Summary for 4-Year B.Mgt. Program Revision Faculty of Management March 24, 2016

Credentials

B.Mgt.

Rationale for the action

The Faculty of Management is proposing modifications to the delivery of its Bachelor of Management program from a 2+2 model to a 4-year model for the 2017-2018 Winter term.

The rationale for the modifications is to increase students' exposure to management courses earlier in their academic careers, providing them greater inclusion in the Faculty and deeper understanding of the subject matter.

If approved, the revised delivery of the program for incoming first-year students would come into effect starting in September 2017 and thereafter. For second-year transfer students, the revised delivery would come into effect for those entering in September 2018 and thereafter. For third-year transfer students, the revised delivery would come into effect for those entering in September 2019 and thereafter.

Background

The Faculty of Management at UBC's Okanagan campus was established in 2005 with a B.Mgt. degree. Presently, it offers course topics such as General Management, Accounting, Entrepreneurial Technology, Finance, Human Resources/Organizational Behaviour, Marketing and Operations/Supply Chain. The Faculty of Management is comprised of 22.5 total teaching faculty: 10 FTE Tenure-track/Tenured faculty, 3.5 FTE 12-month Lecturers, and 9 Sessional and Adjunct Professors.

Enrolment into the Bachelor of Management program has steadily grown over the last decade. Through this time, Faculty of Management faculty and staff engaged in informal discussions with key stakeholders have found that many students valued the Year 3 cohort structure, as it established a foundational network and added to the experience of the program. Some students, though, reported feeling isolated in the first two years of their academic career, wanting to begin building connections and peer networks earlier than their third year of studies. In addition, many other students and alumni reported anecdotally that the program structure with 11 courses in Year 3 did not fit well with other UBC undergraduate programs, GoGlobal, Co-op and international partnerships.

In this context, between September 2014 and February 2016 the Faculty of Management's Undergraduate Curriculum Working Group began investigating how to transition the program

from a 2+2 model to a 4-year program, while maintaining the cohort component valued by students.

Proposed program redesign


The Faculty of Management has developed a revised four-year program structure that rebalances the required courses over all the years, while preserving the much-valued cohort approach. If approved, students on the modified program will begin creating connections with peers in Year 2 of their studies, building on a larger foundation of management subject matter taken during their first year of studies.

The proposed 4-year program structure depicted in the graphic below better integrates courses between management and non-management topics. The 4-year program keeps all current student pathways, courses, minors and entry points into the B.Mgt. program. It also allows for expanded opportunities for students to take part in experiential learning programs, such as GoGlobal and Co-op.

SAMPLE PATHWAY FOR A STUDENT BASED ON MINIMUM DEGREE REQUIREMENTS


CURRENT 2+2 PROGRAM STRUCTURE

The program fundamentals remain the same, with only a few changes proposed to the Degree Requirements:

- Moving 7 MGMT courses from Year 3 to Year 2.
- Reducing the total required credits from 123 to 120, to be consistent with other UBC undergraduate degrees. This is achieved through the elimination of one elective.
- Requiring ECON 102 Principles of Macroeconomics as a Year 1 course
- Spreading non-MGMT elective requirements over all four years

While considering modifications to the program, the Faculty of Management also took the opportunity to suggest housekeeping amendments to the Admission Requirements, Academic

Regulations and Degree Requirements, so as to offer more clarity in areas such as Degree with Honours and Academic Probation.

With the proposed four-year program, a sample pathway based on minimum degree requirements could look like this:

The timing of implementation has also been given significant consideration. Current Bachelor of Management students would not be impacted by the change, as the revised delivery of the program would come into effect for first-year students entering into 2017-2018 Winter Term. The Faculty of Management would operate both programs during the transition, with the phasing out of the 2+2 program when all students are completed. Although this would present future logistical issues to consider, the Faculty of Management thinks this would be the best way to mitigate any adverse impacts on students and to enable a smooth transition to the modified program.

Updates to the Academic Calendar entries have been completed and the Syllabuses have been merged into the new UBC syllabus template. With these proposed changes, the calendar sections for the Faculty of Management (including the Content page, the Bachelor of Management Program page with corresponding Introduction, Admission Requirements,

Academic Regulations and Degree Requirements and Academic Regulations sub-pages) are being either:

- Refined material relating to students entering the B.Mgt. in 2016/2017 or earlier; or
- Tailored material relating to students entering the B.Mgt. in 2017/2018 or thereafter.

Consultation

Given the interest in the program, the Faculty of Management has undertaken a consultation process to give UBC stakeholders, students, alumni and community members the opportunity to give input through a variety of channels.

For the internal consultation, the Faculty of Management realized and appreciated that the resequencing of non-MGMT electives would change the pattern of when Faculty of Management students register for courses in other faculties after 2017/2018. All faculties on UBC's Okanagan campus were consulted, in addition to the Provost Office and Senate Secretariat. Endorsements have been received from School of Engineering, Irving K. Barber School of Arts and Sciences (IKBSAS), Faculty of Creative & Critical Studies (FCCS), Faculty of Education, Health & Social Development and the UBC Okanagan campus Library.

The Faculty of Management also wanted to consider the perspectives and views of a wider set of stakeholders before undertaking any next steps in the program change. A consultation process was launched on Feb. 29 to give the current students, the Management Student Association, the alumni and the community members an opportunity to understand the proposal, ask questions, receive information and provide input. This consultation process ends March 29 and thus far is showing very strong support for the proposed program change (for full details and results, please review the forthcoming "What We Heard" report).

Rationale:

The proposed change to the delivery of the Faculty of Management (FOM) undergraduate degree program (B.Mgt.) from a 2+2 to a 4-year model has prompted a review of the Degree Requirements, Admission Requirements and Academic Regulations for both students entering the new program and those enrolled in the existing program. This document contains the changes to the Academic Calendar webpages for **students who entered the program as first years in 2016/2017 or earlier, or as second years in 2017/2018 or earlier, or as third years in 2018/2019 or earlier.**

With these proposed changes, the calendar sections for the Faculty of Management (including the Contents page, the Bachelor of Management Program page with corresponding sub-pages of Introduction, Admission Requirements, Academic Regulations and Degree Requirements and Academic Regulations) are being either:

- Refined material relating to students entering the B.Mgt. as first years in 2016/2017 or earlier, as second years in 2017/2018 or earlier, or as third years in 2018/2019 or earlier; or
- Tailored material relating to students entering the B.Mgt. as first years in 2017/2018 or later, as second years in 2018/2019 or later, or as third years in 2019/2020 or later.

Housekeeping amendments to Degree Completion, Dean's Honour Roll, Academic Probation and Failed Standing requirements have also been proposed to clarify language and reflect current practices. There is a small change to the Academic Probation rules of placing students on probation if they pass less than 60% of their classes.

Updates to Degree With Honours and Advancement Requirements – as with Degree Requirements - are specific to when students enter the program.

We realize and appreciate that the re-sequencing of Electives will change the pattern of when FOM students register for courses in other Faculties after 2017/2018.

Letter of Permission

Students currently registered in the B.Mgt. may not take courses for credit at another institution without specific written permission. Students who wish to interrupt their UBC studies and take courses at another institution for credit toward their degree must obtain, in advance, a letter of permission from the **Faculty**. The Faculty has no obligation to grant transfer credit unless a letter of permission has been obtained. Students will not normally be permitted to complete the B.Mgt. Dean's Honour Roll

Student transcripts will receive the notation "Dean's Honour Roll" if an overall average of 80% or better is achieved in a program of 27 credits or more in any Winter Session. Exceptions are made for Coop or Exchange students, who require at least 15 credits in a non-Co-op or non-Exchange term for this calculation. To qualify, students must pass all courses. Only courses taken at UBC will be used in this calculation.

Degree with Honours

The words "With Honours" will placed on the transcript of record and the degree certificate of students graduating with the B.Mgt. where the average is 80% or better in all upper-level Management courses. Program Approval

Students are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of registration as it relates to the regulations of the program in which they are enrolled.

Academic Probation

Academic Probation will be assigned at the end of the Winter Session (April) based on performance in that session (Sept-April) and will consider all courses taken in the session. A student will be placed on Academic Probation, while not falling under the provisions for Failed Standing below, if the student:

- earned a sessional cumulative average of 50% to less than 60%; or
- passed less than 60% of the credits

A student placed on Academic Probation at the end of the Winter Session will normally be allowed to register in a maximum of 9 credits per term in the following Winter Session. This credit restriction may be waived at the discretion of the Faculty. Upon request by the student to the Faculty, the Academic Probation credit restriction might be restored if, in the next Winter Session, each Term 1 course grade is 60% or higher.

Program Approval

Students are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of registration as it relates to the regulations of the program in which they are enrolled.

Any variation from a full load must be approved by the Dean of the Faculty of Management.

Unsatisfactory Performance

Students whose performance in the Faculty of Management is unsatisfactory will be required to discontinue study in the Faculty for at least one year. Students who have failed to meet the promotion requirements of the University will be considered to have failed the year and will be required to discontinue study in the University for at least one year.

Student performance is unsatisfactory when the average taken in all courses in a Winter Session, including failed courses, is below 60%. Students will be required to discontinue study in the Faculty after second year if:

- the grade in ENGL 112 is below 60%; or
- the average in the required first-year
 Economics, English, Mathematics,
 Psychology, and Statistics courses is below
 60%.

The credit restriction will only be enforced if the student is notified before the subsequent Winter Session begins.

Failed Standing

Failed Standing will be assigned at the end of the Winter Session (April) based on performance in that session (Sept-April). The evaluation will consider all courses taken in the session. Failed standing will be assigned to a student who has:

 a sessional cumulative average of less than 50%.

A student placed on Failed Standing for the first time will normally be required to discontinue studies in the Faculty for a period of one academic year (12 months) prior to applying for readmission. Affected students will be issued a letter from the Faculty outlining a decision and next steps. Students who consider applying for readmission the following year must complete further study at another recognized post-secondary institution during the year away.

Students are strongly advised to consult the Faculty prior to further academic study.

Students who are readmitted after being required to discontinue study in the Faculty <u>following</u> a failed year will receive credit toward the B.Mgt. only for those <u>university transferable</u> courses in that year <u>away</u> in which they obtained a grade of at least 60%.

A student who already has a Failed Standing on their academic record will be required to withdraw from the University and may only be

Students at any level of university study who are required for a second time to discontinue studies in the Faculty, whether in repeating a year or in a later year, will be required to withdraw from the University.

Readmission to the Faculty of Management in such cases is normally not granted. Students who fail the year or are required to discontinue study in the Faculty may apply for readmission only after 12 months.

Students who are readmitted after being required to discontinue study in the Faculty or after a failed year will receive credit toward the B.Mgt. only for those

readmitted under the Advancement Regulations.

Readmission to the Faculty of Management <u>after a</u> <u>second failed year</u> is normally not granted.

Courses taken in the Summer Session are not taken into consideration for assigning Failed Standing.

Advancement Requirements

Students are expected to register in a full load of courses.

To earn promotion from first to second year, a student must have completed a minimum of 27 credits.

To earn a promotion from second to third year, a student must have completed <u>54</u> credits, including the core courses of MGMT 100, MGMT 200, ECON 101, MATH 100 or 116, <u>PSYO</u> 111, STAT 121 or 124, and ENGL 112 (or 6 credits of any ENGL), with a minimum core average of 60%. A minimum grade of 60% in ENGL 112 (or an average minimum grade of 60% over 6 credits of any ENGL), is also required.

To earn a promotion from third to fourth year, students must complete 78 credits including at least 8 of the following courses: MGMT 301, MGMT 302, MGMT 310, MGMT 320, MGMT 330, MGMT 340, MGMT 350, MGMT 355, MGMT 360, MGMT 380 or MGMT 390.

Students whose academic records, as determined by the tests and examinations of Term 1, are found to be unsatisfactory may be required to discontinue attendance in Management for the remainder of the session.

Advancement Requirements

The B.Mgt. is a full-time, four-year program. Students are expected to register in a full load of courses unless they have been granted advanced standing.

To earn promotion from first to second year, a student must have completed a minimum of 27 credits.

To earn a promotion from second to third year, a student must have completed 60 credits including the core courses of MGMT 100, MGMT 200, ECON 101, MATH 100 or 116, PSYC 111, STAT 121 or 124, and ENGL 112, with a minimum core average of 60%. A minimum grade of 60% in ENGL 112 is also required.

Requirements for promotion from third to fourth year have yet to be determined.

Rationale:

The proposed change to the delivery of the Faculty of Management (FOM) undergraduate degree program (B.Mgt.) from a 2+2 to a 4-year model has prompted a review of both the Degree Requirements and Academic Regulations, for both students entering the new program and those enrolled in the existing program. This document contains the changes to the Academic Calendar webpages for students entering the program as first years in 2017/2018 or later, or as second years in 2018/2019 or later, or as third years in 2019/2020 or later.

With these proposed changes, the calendar sections for Faculty of Management (including the Contents page, the Bachelor of Management Program page with corresponding sub-pages of Introduction, Admission Requirements, Academic Regulations and Degree Requirements) are being either:

- Refined material relating to students entering the B.Mgt. as first years in 2016/2017 or earlier, or as second years in 2017/2018 or earlier, or as third years in 2018/2019 or earlier; or
- Tailored material relating to students entering the B.Mgt. as first years in 2017/2018 or later, or as second years in 2018/2019 or later, or as third years in 2019/2020 or later.

The proposed Degree Requirements for students entering the program as first years in 2017/2018 or later, as second years in 2018/2019 or later, or as third years in 2019/2020 or later, are fundamentally the same as in previous years. However, modifications include the following:

- 7 MGMT courses moved from Third Year to Second Year
- Total required credits reduced from 123 to 120
- ECON 102 Principles of Macroeconomics made a required course
- Elective requirements spread over all 4 years

In line with current practice, students will still be able to choose each Non-Management Elective at either lower-level or upper-level, where possible.



The current Admission Requirements were revised to establish the proposed Admission Requirements for entry into First Year, Second Year and Third Year.

The Academic Regulations were established in line with current calendar entries with substantial changes to the Advancement Requirements section – these are specific to when students enter the program.

We realize and appreciate that the re-sequencing of Electives will change the pattern of when FOM students register for courses in other Faculties after 2017/2018.

a) New Award: Connaghan Family Bursary in Arts and Sciences

A \$2,000 bursary is offered by the Connaghan family to a student with a declared major in arts or sciences in the Irving K. Barber School of Arts and Sciences at the University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. The bursary is made in recognition of the family's strong commitment to the pursuit of a post-secondary education even in the face of financial challenges. The family has a significant history with UBC beginning with Charles Connaghan who was president of the AMS in the 1950s, VP of Administrative Services in the 1970's, and recipient of the Great Trekker Award in 1994. All members of the Connaghan family have at least one degree from UBC. The bursary will alternate annually between a student in arts and a student in sciences. Preference is given to a student demonstrating the greatest assessed financial need (first award available in the 2015 Winter Session).

b) New Award: UBC Vantage College Excellence Award

Awards ranging in value up to the full cost of the student's academic program and living cost are offered to students beginning their undergraduate studies at UBC in the UBC Vantage College Vantage One Program. The value of each award is dependent on the recipient's financial need. The awards will be renewed for up to three additional years or to degree completion, whichever is less, provided the recipient remains in the top quartile of the year of his/her program and maintains their status as an international student in Canada. Award winners will have their award reviewed annually to assess and update academic progress and financial need. In addition to academic merit, the award will be made on the consideration of financial need. The award is made on the recommendation of UBC Vantage College in consultation with the UBC International Student Initiative

Rationale: The UBC Vantage College Excellence Award was approved in April 2014 by the UBC Vancouver senate, with the first awards offered to Vantage One students in the 2014W academic session. We are now seeking approval of this award by the UBC Okanagan senate so that Vantage One students who transition into degree programs at the UBC Okanagan campus are eligible to receive this award. The first set of UBC Vantage One students will transition into degree programs at the UBC Okanagan campus in the 2016W academic session. The first awards offered to UBC Vantage One students who are heading towards degree programs at UBC Okanagan will be offered in the 2016W academic session, with students transitioning to the UBC Okanagan campus in the 2017W academic session.

Additional Information:

Funding for the awards:

- The first year of the award will be funded by UBC Vantage College Student Financial Assistance funds derived from a percentage of the student tuition fees paid by UBC Vantage College students.
- The upper year funding for the award will be funded by the ISI Student Financial Assistance funds derived from a percentage of ISI tuition fees.
- UBC Vantage College and the ISI will collaborate annually to determine an appropriate budget based on both funds which in turn will determine how many new UBC Vantage College Excellence Awards can be offered each year.

Renewal:

Students coming in under the UBC Vantage College Excellence Award will be academically outstanding, but likely from economically disadvantaged backgrounds. The awards will be renewed for up to three additional years or to degree completion, whichever is less, provided the recipient maintains Senate approved GPA and credit enrolment as well as maintains their status as an international student in Canada.

program to Earth and Environmental Sciences (EESC).

Rationale:

The change in the name of the graduate program from Environmental Sciences (ENVI) to Earth and Environmental Sciences (EESC) is requested to reflect the research areas and interests of those participating in the program. The ENVI program has a long history (extending back to Okanagan University College) and was originally devised to be broadly inclusive because of constraints related to the transition to UBCO. The 'Environmental Science' moniker served a purpose when proposed, but recent hires and graduate supervision activities have significantly increased the active 'Earth Sciences' component of research. Such a change is also necessary to better align with student expectations and address student concerns. Some of the graduate students conducting 'Earth Sciences' research have reported experiences where current or potential employers or supervisors have expressed negative preconceptions about the nature of the skills and experience acquired during an 'Environmental Sciences' degree that may not align with the actual work/research the students conducted.

No course content or program requirements are to be changed as part of this requested renaming.

Dr. Peter Arthur Chair, Curriculum Committee Preamble. The two ENGLISH courses in this proposal are required and the 8 CHEMISTRY and BIOLOGY courses in this proposal are strongly recommended but not strictly required as part of the application for UBC's Faculty of Medicine. It is proposed that these courses be integrated into the three engineering programs at UBC's Okanagan campus, as a Pre-Med Alternative Path (P-MAP). Such a P-MAP exists as an option for students entering the engineering programs at UBC's Vancouver campus. It is proposed that students entering Year-1 of the engineering programs at UBC's Okanagan campus would be eligible to apply for the P-MAP, and the successful applicants would take P-MAP courses in their engineering program. Students completing their engineering program with the P-MAP courses receive their engineering degree and are well positioned to apply for admission to UBC's Faculty of Medicine.

Proposal. It is proposed that the Irving K. Barber School of Arts and Science and the Faculty of Creative and Critical Studies accept P-MAP students from the School of Engineering for entrance into ENGL 112, ENGL 150/151/153, CHEM 121, CHEM 123, CHEM 121, BIOL 116, BIOL 125, CHEM 213, and CHEM 214, subject to the following terms:

- · A maximum of TEN (10) students entering Year-1 of the engineering programs will be accepted into the P-MAP, with an application process being used by the School of Engineering to select the students that are allowed to enter the P-MAP.
- · The proposal would be effective over three academic years, 2016-17, 2017-18, and 2018-19, after which time the Irving K. Barber School of Arts and Science, Faculty of Creative and Critical Studies, and School of Engineering will review the terms of this proposal.

Course details. There are TEN (10) P-MAP courses. FOUR (4) are credited for engineering program courses. SIX (6) are completed in addition to engineering program courses. The six additional courses result in an extra term of study. Course details are given here. ENGLISH requirements and recommendations.

- 1. ENGL 112 is credited for APSC 176 in Year-1, as is currently allowed for engineering transfer students (ENGL first-year course prereqs.: one of a. 70% in English 12 or English 12 First Peoples; b. 5 on the LPI; c. passing grade in the Okanagan campus' Writing 009; d. or an acceptable equivalent).
- 2. ENGL 150 or 151 or 153 is credited for the humanities elective in Year-5, as is currently allowed for all engineering students. CHEMISTRY requirements and recommendations.
- 3. CHEM 121 is credited for APSC 182 in Year-1, as is currently allowed for engineering transfer students.
- 4. CHEM 123 is credited for APSC 183 in Year-1, as is currently allowed for engineering transfer students (pre-reg.: CHEM 121). BIOLOGY requirements and recommendations.
- 5. BIOL 116 is completed in Year-2 (co-req.: CHEM 121).
- 6. BIOL 125 is completed in Year-2 (pre-req.: BIOL 116; co-req.: CHEM 123).

ORGANIC CHEMISTRY requirements and recommendations.

- 7. CHEM 213 is completed in Year-3 (pre-req.: CHEM 123).
- 8. CHEM 214 is completed in Year-3 (pre-req.: CHEM 213).

Pre-Med Alternative Path (P-MAP)

This alternative path is intended for students with an engineering background wishing to apply to UBC's medical school and potentially others. It provides access to courses strongly recommended by many medical schools for students to be considered for admission.

Present Academic Calendar Entry: N/A

Different medical schools have different course requirements. Students are strongly advised to verify the course requirements with prospective medical schools. It should also be noted that the course requirements are only one of the criteria used by medical schools to assess applications. It is the student's responsibility to be informed of the applicable criteria.

The ten P-MAP courses are integrated into the existing three engineering programs, and are taken in parallel with engineering courses. Four are counted towards engineering requirements:

- **ENGL 112 (in place of APSC 176)**
- <u>CHEM 121 & 123 (in place of APSC 182 & 183)</u>
- ENGL 150, 151 or 153 (in place of humanities credit)

Six are in addition to engineering courses:

Given the additional courses taken over and above the engineering degree, students should on average expect an additional term to complete these course requirements along with their engineering degree requirements. Some courses may be offered in the Summer Session.

Minor in Computer Science for Engineering Students School of Engineering University of British Columbia

Preamble

The School of Engineering (SOE) was established in 2005. As of Nov. 13, 2015, it has 47 faculty members and offers 3 BASc programs, i.e. civil engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering. In 2015W, the faculty offered courses to about 1000 full-time equivalent students.

In August 2015, a student-driven survey was conducted to gauge interest for a Minor in Computer Science (COSC) for engineering students. Sixty-three students responded. Results are given below.

Would you be in support of a Minor in Computer Science option being available for engineering students?



If it were offered, would you consider pursuing a Minor in Computer Science?



Based on the survey results, we expect a strong enrolment in the proposed program for the COSC Minor.

It is expected that students who complete the minor will:

- Have strong technical foundation upon which to build further expertise in computer science and engineering
- Strengthen their understanding of the applications of computers in their selected fields
- Enhance their employability

The proposed program will offer an interdisciplinary theme which will enrich student education experiences as mandated in the UBC strategic plan.

Admission

The program will be offered at the University of British Columbia's Okanagan Campus. The School of Engineering will offer and administer this program. The Computer Science Unit in Irving K. Barber School of Arts and Sciences will deliver the courses.

The program is open to engineering students in their 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} and 4^{th} year study. The deadline of application is May 31. The admission is competitive entry based on GPA.

Expected Start Date

The program will be offered in the 2016W academic year.

Program Requirements – Proposal

A COSC Minor is being proposed to Bachelor of Applied Science majors. A **maximum** of 30 students will be accepted into the COSC minor on a competitive basis following an application process in the School of Engineering.

The proposed COSC Minor requires a total of 30 credits in COSC including 12 lower level (1st and 2nd year) credits and 18 upper level (3rd and 4th year) credits.

For the 12 lower level credits, students will take THREE (3) COSC foundation courses (COSC 111, COSC 121 and COSC 122) and one other 1st or 2nd year course. To accommodate scheduling conflicts and students in the engineering co-op program, engineering students would be advised to take these three courses in the summer following their first year of study. The Computer Science Unit was consulted on this. COSC 111 and 121 are currently offered during the summer, and COSC 122 can be offered in the summer (to a minimum of 20 students).

Rationale:

Chemistry 447 was introduced at Okanagan University College. While it represented a potentially useful capstone experience, the course tended to be used by students about to graduate who found themselves three credits short of completing their degree. There were no requirements or expectations beyond the writing of a literature review, and standards and consistencies in those expectations were not well-maintained. Given its usual role as an afterthought resulting from poor planning, the course was very rarely taken (and then usually by weaker students), and it was not well-integrated into the rest of the curriculum. As the research mandate of the Department of Chemistry and the quality and number of our students has increased, we have developed a successful undergraduate research program, driven primarily by our laboratory-based research capstone courses CHEM 448 and CHEM 449, which have adapted and updated accordingly. In contrast, CHEM 447 was last taken by one student in the 2005W session, and has been largely neglected.

Many students in the Chemistry and Environmental Chemistry programs would benefit from scholarship that entails large-scale and in-depth analysis of existing data and information, rather than the generation of new results in the traditional model of laboratory research. A comprehensive analysis and critical evaluation of a literature topic remains one possible undertaking to offer this experience, but others can include data-based research in the form of analysis and interpretation of chemically-significant database information, or a meta-analysis and statistical interpretation of the results of a wide range of research papers. These latter research methodologies are well-established in other disciplines, and are now emerging in chemistry as well, but our current courses offer our students very limited opportunities to engage in such methods. We feel that such experiences would be of greater interest and impact than traditional laboratory research for many of our students, such as those bound for medical or law school, or those interested in careers that include policy development, risk management, or research with large data sets.

To provide such an opportunity at the same high-level and rigorous as our laboratory research courses, we are broadening the scope and more-clearly delineating higher expectations for CHEM 447. The course will require original scholarship, analysis, and critical evaluation of existing data and results, and will now involve a formal public presentation of findings, as do CHEM 448 and 449. A-level grades will be reserved for

publishable-quality work. Given these new expectations, we believe a 64% (C+) average is no longer sufficient to offer a reasonable chance of success in the course. The 72% (B) requirement will parallel the new requirement for CHEM 448 (Directed Studies in Chemistry), and is better reflective of both our expectations for and the abilities of our current students; it is not as great as that of CHEM 449 (Honours Thesis in Chemistry, 75%). The added recommendation that the course not be taken until a student's final year parallels current language and policy in both C?HEM 448 and CHEM 449.

Cross Campus Co-op Pilot Project

Background

Over the past few years there has been growing interest in making co-op opportunities available to all students on the Okanagan campus. As a result of the MGMT review of its course offerings and the growing interest in co-op from other Faculties, it has been proposed that a campus wide co-op program be established with a cross campus pilot project planned for the next three years. The Deans of FHSD, FCCS and IKBSAS have been meeting with the Dean of MGMT, the Co-op Manager in MGMT and the Director of Academic Operations from the Provost office, to discuss the terms of this proposed pilot project. The proposal is that the accredited MGMT co-op program will be used as the model for the pilot project. This document is a summary of the plan for the pilot project.

Joint Co-op Program Pilot

It has been proposed that the content and structure of the MGMT co-op program would be available to all students on campus and would be administered out of a co-op office that is not controlled by any one Faculty, but in reality would make use of the expertise and contacts of the current staff of the MGMT program while being overseen by all participating Faculties. The particulars of the Joint Pilot are as follows:

1. Partnership Agreement between Faculties

The participating Faculties (expected to be FCCS, FHSD, IKBSAS and MGMT) will enter into an agreement for the term of the Joint Pilot Project. The partnership agreement will articulate the required contributions from each faculty, including but not limited to: budget funding, office space, and faculty and staff contributions. This agreement will set out the governance of the Joint Pilot.

2. Co-op office organization

The organization of the Joint Pilot would be a team leader and 1 to 2 coordinators. The team leader will be the current Co-op Manager in MGMT because this existing position is where the expertise and community contacts currently reside. The number of coordinators will be determined by the number of students admitted to the Joint Pilot.

3. Faculty Supervision

Each participating Faculty will be required to identify faculty advisors who will be able to assist the coordinators on appropriate placements and evaluation of assignments if they are discipline specific.

4. Course registration

Four new courses have been created with the same curricular content as the MGCO courses but with the generic "COOP" course code. All BA and BSc. students will be registered in the COOP courses which will appear on their transcripts.

5. Finance

The particulars of the financial obligations of the Faculties will be determined in the partnership agreement.

6. Evaluation and duration

The Joint Pilot should be evaluated after the first intake and each year thereafter for the period of the pilot, to take into account: the demand for seats (aggregate and by Faculty); available work opportunities in the community (locally, regionally, provincially, nationally, internationally); relationship building in the community/ies; indirect benefits in terms of further experiential learning opportunities, research and community impact; revenues and costs with a view to sustainability of the program; successful placement of students (determinants of "success" to be determined); and administrative structure, including need for more or less staffing based on demand in program.

7. Other Advantages to the Joint Pilot

The fact that the MGMT program is already accredited should allow the other Faculties to recruit on the basis of an accredited co-op program without independently having to go through the accreditation process.

Students wishing to enrol in the Co-op program typically apply in the Winter Session, Term 1 of their third year, however other entry points may be possible if requested and will be evaluated on a case by case basis. The Joint Pilot may allow for greater flexibility in the scheduling of work terms which may improve the attrition/completion rates in the co-op program.

Finally, based on feedback from recruiters, it is expected that having an accredited coop program available to all students on campus is likely to have a positive impact on the number of applications and yield rate for our campus. This is potentially a very useful mechanism for increasing applications and accepted offers in the humanities.
