Business Arising from the Minutes

The President noted that at the end of the last Senate meeting, a notice of intent to make a motion was raised by Senator Lavallee regarding Workday Student grades for Vantage College. He confirmed that Senator Lavallee has withdrawn the motion after discussions aimed at resolving the issue. The President noted that the matter was addressed.

Senator Fox responded by noting that IRP had engaged with Vantage College to understand the problem and proposed a solution that met the College's specific needs. Senator Fox noted satisfaction with this proposed solution.

Remarks from the Chair

The President noted hope that everyone had a fulfilling Thanksgiving weekend. He reflected on the importance of gratitude as he approached the one-year mark in his role at the University. He acknowledged the busy midterm season for students and commended those supporting students during this time. The President noted that the upcoming Provincial General Election on October 19. He further noted the University's nonpartisan stance and highlighted the potential impact of Provincial Government policies on the post-secondary sector. He encouraged all members to vote.

The President also provided an update on the strategic plan refresh process. He outlined the formation of a steering committee, led by the Provosts and the VP, Research and Innovation, supported by a diverse advisory committee. The refresh is aimed to establish a long-term vision for the University, define short-term priorities for the next three to five years, and continue mobilizing existing institutional plans. The President invited Senators to engage in upcoming opportunities for input, and noted that their perspectives were vital to shaping the University's future.



Admissions Committee

The Chair of the Senate Admissions Committee, Dr Joanne Fox, presented.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE – CURRENT STUDENT – DEFFERED ENTRY

That Senate approve the revised Calendar entry on 'Applications from Current Graduate Students' for applicants to the Doctor of Medicine program, effective for the 2025 Session and thereafter.

Senator Fox noted that the proposed revision to the calendar entry provided clear guidance for current graduate students applying to the MD Program. This change specified that current graduate students must complete their degrees before being admitted to the MD Program and clarified that deferrals are only permitted under exceptional circumstances.

Senator Hirst asked if the proposed change also applied to the MD-PhD Program.

Senator Fox responded that the Committee had discussed this and confirmed that the MD-PhD Program had a separate application process.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE – ADMISSIONS SELECTION PROCESS

That Senate approve the revised Calendar entry on 'Selection Process' for applicants to the Doctor of Medicine program, effective for the 2025 Summer Session and thereafter.

Senator Fox presented changes to the admissions selection process for the MD program. She noted that the Admissions Committee reviewed the process, specifically addressing the accommodations made for students whose studies were affected during the 2019-2020 Academic Year due to the transition to online learning. These accommodations, which allowed for the exclusion of certain courses from admissions consideration, are now deemed unnecessary, as students have had ample time to complete their requirements without special consideration.

Senator von Bergmann asked whether similar clauses exist in other Faculties' admission processes.



The Clerk responded that there were three allowances made during the COVID-19 Pandemic, and that this was the only one that remained in the Academic Calendar.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE – APPLICANTS WITH DISABILITIES

To approve and recommend to Senate for approval the revised Calendar entry on ‘Applicants with Disabilities’ for applicants to the Doctor of Medicine program, effective for the 2025 Summer Session and thereafter.

Senator Fox noted that the changes provided more comprehensive information about the application process and aligned with new core competencies for medical students.

Senator Fox noted praise for the Faculty of Medicine for their clarity and initiative in this matter, which had sparked a positive discussion within the Committee.

Senator Fontana noted commendation for the thoroughness of the revisions, and shared personal insights as a student with a disability and noted the significant impact of the changes.

Senator Lorien also noted commendation, and suggested that other Faculties should consider similar language revisions to eliminate barriers.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS AND CORE COMPETENCIES FOR ENTERING MEDICAL STUDENTS

That the Senate approve the revised Doctor of Medicine degree requirements and “Core Competencies for Medical Students Entering the MD Undergraduate Program” brought forward by the Faculty of Medicine, effective for the 2025 Summer Session and thereafter.



Senator Fox noted that the revisions included changes to degree requirements, provided current information about foundational theme areas and updated course names as well as the introduction of new core competencies for entering medical students. She noted the functional abilities and core competencies necessary for admission that replaced the 2013 standards for admission, promotion and graduation. She further noted the importance of these updates in ensuring that the admissions process aligns with current educational standards and expectations.

Senator von Bergmann asked how award criteria was determined. She noted potential conflicts of interest regarding named awards and questioned whether there were specific criteria within UBC documents detailing the processes for external individuals to fund awards.

The Clerk explained that various regulations govern student awards, including the Senate Policy V200.2 on Student Awards and Board of Governors Policy FM6 on Fundraising and Acceptance of Donations. He further noted that these regulations determine whether UBC would accept funding from a specific donor for an award.

Senator von Bergmann clarified that she did not have a specific concern but noted the lack of transparency in the available documentation.

The Clerk responded that detailed gift agreements accompany each donation, outlining the source and intended use of the funds. He noted that it would be impractical to present all documents due to their volume, but offered to share relevant agreements as needed.

CURRICULUM PROPOSALS

That the Senate approve the new non-credit program microcertificate and new course brought forward by Extended Learning and the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (Forestry).

Senator Rawn introduced a new noncredit microcertificate program focused on opinion polling methods. The program was developed in collaboration with UBC Extended Learning and the Department of Political Science and included five modules and a hands-on project in survey design and data analysis. It was designed for a diverse range of learners, including professionals from various industries including public servants. She also provided an overview of the one course for approval.

Senator Marshall noted that the microcertificate's learning activities appeared to total 10 hours of pre-recorded lectures.

Senator Rawn clarified that the hours accounted for total work, including tests and projects.

Senator Bates reiterated the response made by Senator Rawn, and noted that the program was structured for working professionals.

Senator Lavallee noted that the appeals process described in the microcredential documentation and further noted that it could lead to confusion with academic misconduct procedures.

Senator Rawn acknowledged Senator Lavallee's feedback and noted the need for future clarity.

Senator Graham asked about the statistical preparedness expected from learners, and noted the importance of statistical understanding in interpreting survey data.



Senator Rawn confirmed that while there were no strict prerequisites for statistical training, the course included basic statistical concepts in one of its modules.

Dean Crowston noted that the course aimed to introduce fundamental statistical principles to enhance learners' comprehension of polling methods.

Report from the Provost

The Provost, Dr Gage Averill, presented.

SHAPING UBC'S NEXT CENTURY – STRATEGIC PLAN REFRESH

The Provost outlined the need to reassess the University's strategic plan, which was halfway through its ten-year timeline. With the arrival of a new president, he noted that this was an opportune moment to align leadership goals with the existing plan. He highlighted significant global changes over the past five years, such as the impacts of COVID-19 on education, the rise of generative AI and geopolitical issues affecting student mobility.

The focus of the plan refresh would be on enhancing the University's academic mission, aiming to establish it as the best in Canada and among the top globally. The Provost shared a vision extending to 2050, and identified priorities and actions for the next three to five years.

Senator Hassib raised a Point of Personal Privilege that the slide deck was not visible on the display screens in the room.

In response, the President directed the Senate staff to resolve the technical difficulty.

The slide deck was not able to be displayed.

The President directed the Provost to proceed with the presentation and invited those in attendance to view the slides on a neighbour's electronic device.

The Provost provided an overview of the governance structure related to a strategic refresh. He highlighted the central role of the steering committee, which included the two Provosts and the Vice-President, Research and Innovation. He noted the involvement of an advisory committee and special advisors focusing on Indigenous issues and equity. He noted that they collaborated with the Board of Governors and the Senates, drawing staff from various offices to assist in the process.

The Provost outlined the timeline and phases of the refresh process. They completed the initial phase, which involved the establishment of the governance structure and review of current documents and achievements. Phase two began in September and involved engaging the community to develop a long-term vision for the University. This included conducting sessions to gather input and validating outcomes with governance bodies.



In the upcoming phases, the team planned to identify priorities and metrics, and conduct further engagement sessions with the academic community. They aimed to develop a narrative and implementation roadmap by spring. The final phase would conclude with a presentation of the plan to the Senate and the Board of Governors for endorsement, followed by the launch of communications to mobilize the implementation structure.

The Provost emphasized the importance of Senate involvement throughout the process and encouraged attendees to review the provided materials for upcoming engagement opportunities.

Senator Hassib expressed gratitude for the Provost's presentation but noted concerns about student affordability in the strategic refresh document. He noted that affordability lacked references in the original strategic plan and highlighted issues like food insecurity that were absent from the discussion. Senator Hassib further noted the importance of addressing these matters actively, referencing the Student Affordability Task Force and the challenges it faced in making proposals viable due to economic constraints. He asked what the administration planned to do to enhance efforts in these areas beyond existing documentation.

In response, the Provost acknowledged the feedback and clarified that the current document was intended to outline the process rather than specific goals or priorities. He noted that the issues raised were significant and should be incorporated as the planning process progressed. The Provost highlighted the role of the Student Affordability Task Force, and stated that its findings would be integrated into the strategic refresh, as they were vital to the University's planning efforts. He noted ongoing accomplishments in improving affordability for students and expressed his willingness to engage further with Senator Hassib to discuss these important issues.

Senator Singh thanked the Provost for the presentation and shared concerns regarding the economic challenges faced by the University, particularly due to declining international student enrolment. He inquired about plans to gather information on potential government models for student admission and the impact of Provincial Government funding on the University's budget. Senator Singh noted the need for better involvement of marginalized groups, especially Indigenous and international students, in addressing issues like housing and food security.

The Provost acknowledged the importance of these concerns. He noted that the University was considering budget matters related to international student enrolment, and mentioning the Strategic Recruitment and Admissions Task Force as the main body addressing these challenges.

Regarding Provincial Government funding, the Provost stated that recent funding for housing had put UBC in a favourable position compared to other institutions across



Canada. He noted that the University would continue to advocate for support from the Provincial Government and engage with various constituencies.

The Provost also noted the commitment to include Indigenous perspectives and input from other marginalized populations through dedicated forums and outreach efforts.

Dr Gail Murphy added that they had advisors in place to ensure underrepresented voices were heard during the consultation process, confirming the administration's intention to engage these communities actively.

Senator Britton expressed thanks for the presentation and the outlined governance structure. He noted the engagement of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies, and the role of Dean Hunt. Senator Britton noted the need for the graduate community to have a direct role in the process, especially given the ongoing changes and investments in areas like housing. He further noted the importance of including both students and staff, alongside faculty, in the discussions.

The Provost agreed that graduate education was crucial and emphasizing the University's focus on research, teaching and learning.

Dr Murphy explained that they were engaging all Deans and faculty members directly. She mentioned upcoming virtual sessions and a pop-up event, and encouraged the campus community to participate in these consultations and to complete an online survey. She noted that all feedback would be carefully reviewed and categorized.

Senator Fox thanked Dr Murphy and the Provost for their efforts and noted appreciation for the commitment to validate the content and priorities that would emerge and inquired about the timeline for providing updates on the emerging themes to the Senate.

Dr Murphy responded that they planned to return to the Senate in January, where they would present the feedback and themes gathered from the first phase of consultations. She noted the importance of sharing this feedback with the community and mentioned that a survey would also be available to ensure they accurately captured the thoughts expressed during the consultations.

The Provost added that they had already introduced the process to the Board of Governors, noting the Board's deep involvement and interest in the discussions. He highlighted the potential for this process to engage a broader community in meaningful discussions that often go unnoticed due to time constraints.



Senator Fontana thanked the presenters and noted concerns about the implications of changes in international student enrolment on the University's finances. He asked for clarification on how the strategic plan would align with budgetary changes, particularly regarding the tuition allocation model. He noted interest in understanding whether this model would be addressed within the strategic plan or in separate plans, and how feedback from the Senate would be incorporated into those discussions.

The President acknowledged the importance of the question, and explained that strategy and budget considerations should be interrelated. He noted that establishing strategy first is a best practice, allowing the budget to support the strategic goals. He confirmed that this year's focus was primarily on the strategic piece, while efforts to gather information for potential modifications to the budget model were already underway, with more significant discussions expected next year.

The Provost added that they had decided to refresh the budget model after 15 years and recognized the need for dialogue between the strategic plan refresh and budget considerations. He noted that while both processes were running in parallel, the strategic plan would not delve deeply into budget specifics, allowing for creative and open planning within the discussions.

Senator Graham noted concerns about climate change, its significance as a global challenge and emphasized the need for the University to broaden its focus beyond local emissions. He noted that the Climate Action Plan 2030 primarily addressed UBC's internal operations and called for more emphasis on the University's potential international impact through research and outreach. He suggested that future discussions should include strategies for global engagement in climate action.

The Provost agreed with Senator Graham, acknowledging the University's historical contributions to climate research and emphasizing ongoing initiatives aimed at making a broader impact. He mentioned that discussions were ongoing regarding how various faculties could collaborate on climate-related research and practices.

The President added that while having a Climate Action Plan for operations was important, the University's influence stemmed from educating students who could enact change worldwide. He reiterated the necessity of leveraging research and innovation to address broader issues, including climate change.

Senator Doering asked about the scope of the strategic plan refresh, including whether any elements from the original plan would be excluded or if specific academic and research areas would be prioritized.



The Provost responded that while the refresh would focus on academic missions, issues such as community wellness would still be recognized but might not be the primary focus. He noted that the refresh aimed to enhance UBC's contributions to academia and society.

Dr Murphy added that the initial phase of the refresh considered the University's future up to 2050, noting not only the institution's academic focus but also the demographic diversity of its learners. She noted that this phase would have a broader perspective, while later phases would concentrate more specifically on academic and research objectives to align with the University's long-term vision.

Senator Hassib noted the need for concrete action items in the strategic plan refresh, noting that attendees want to provide feedback on various topics. He pointed out that the current strategic plan remained high-level and lacked specific, actionable strategies. He asked about the formation of a working group to transform the abstract goals into tangible policy changes that could significantly impact the community.

The Provost clarified that the focus of the current document was primarily on the process of refreshing the plan. He noted that the ideas generated would be assessed for implementation over the next three to five years, emphasizing an action-oriented approach.

The President agreed with Senator Hassib's concerns and provided examples of previous successful operationalizations of plans, such as the Indigenous Strategic Plan and the Climate Action Plan. He emphasized the importance of identifying further actionable areas within the refresh.

Senator Rawn noted the limited timeline for the strategic plan refresh and pointed to a lack of deliberate engagement for Senators in the initial data gathering and listening phases. She noted that many workshops for the broader University community had already occurred, and she hoped for more active involvement from senators in the early stages of the process to harness their energy and insights, rather than only during later validation phases.

The Provost responded that they intended to encourage Senators to participate in various forums and community gathering sessions. He recognized that some opportunities had already passed but reaffirmed the commitment to involve Senators in the process moving forward.

Senator von Bergmann expressed concern about the timing and awareness of the strategic plan refresh process. She emphasized the need for earlier engagement from Senators.



The President clarified that the process had been communicated through an email to the community over the summer and that he had dedicated his remarks to it during the first Senate meeting. He acknowledged the feedback and encouraged further discussion among Senators about the plan moving forward, suggesting that the team would take this input into consideration for future proposals.

Senator Fontana suggested that the Senate should have representation in the strategic plan refresh process, possibly through a sub-committee or operational committee. He noted the importance of having someone to represent the Senate's perspective.

Dr Murphy responded that there is already a strategic plan refresh advisory group that includes student representation, ensuring diverse voices are part of the process. She noted that the refresh is currently in its first phase, focusing on overarching goals, with further specific priorities and actions to be addressed later.

The President acknowledged the interest from Senators for more direct input and proposed the possibility of adding another consultation session.

Dr Murphy agreed to discuss this with the team, and mentioned that they are still conducting consultations, especially with underrepresented groups, but it would depend on their capacity to organize additional sessions.

Provost thanked the Senate for their attention and encouraged participation in the strategic plan refresh.

The President also expressed gratitude to all those involved and noted that this was just the beginning of the process. He noted that Senators would continue to be engaged in meaningful ways and that further proposals would be presented throughout the year.

Report from the Registrar

The Registrar, Dr Rella Ng, presented.

2024 SENATE BY-ELECTION RESULTS

The Registrar advised Senate that Pursuant to Section 15 of the *University Act*, Martin Hirst, Professor, was acclaimed as elected as representative of the Science Faculty on the Vancouver



Campus on the Vancouver Senate for a term ending 31 August 2026 and thereafter until a successor is elected.

Appendix A: Awards Report

NEW AWARDS – ENDOWED

George M. Cummins Award in Law

Awards totalling \$2,550 have been made available through an endowment established by George Cummins (B.Com., M.B.A., LL.B. 1971) for domestic students entering the J.D. program. George spent most of his professional career as a professor teaching domestic and foreign taxation and business law, as well as holding external non-academic positions in business, law and taxation. George hopes the award, which commemorates the 50th anniversary of his graduation from UBC, will have a significant impact on future generations of students in helping them to achieve their legal aspirations. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Peter A. Allard School of Law. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).

James H. Dehoney Entrepreneurship and Innovation Bursary

Bursaries totalling \$1,750 have been made available through an endowment established by Navacord and the Dehoney family, in memory of James “Jim” H. Dehoney (B.B.A.), for Bachelor of Commerce students. Preference will be given to students in the Entrepreneurship option. After starting his career in insurance at Manulife, Jim soon founded Dehoney Financial Group, a Consulting firm providing group benefits, retirement, and financial advice. Jim was a forward-thinking visionary in the sector, pioneering the use of new technology for benefits and retirement planning. He loved learning throughout his life, always talking about the latest book he was reading and sharing what he learned with others. Jim’s greatest satisfaction came from helping others, which he did with boundless enthusiasm. This bursary was created to honour Jim’s entrepreneurial spirit and commitment to lifelong learning, and to support students who have a desire to attend university. The bursaries are adjudicated by Enrolment Services. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).

Pieter VandenBos Memorial Award in Football

Awards totalling \$2,100, which may range from a minimum value of \$500 each to the maximum allowable under athletic association regulations, have been made available through an endowment established by Jim Pattison Lease, in memory of Pieter VandenBos (1961–2023), for members of the UBC Thunderbirds Football team, in any year of study, who demonstrate an exceptional work ethic and determination. Pieter (B.A. 1983), a member of the 1982 Vanier Cup champion team, was an offensive lineman and the fourth overall pick in the 1983 Canada Football League (CFL) draft. He played seven seasons in the CFL before ending his career with the BC Lions in 1989. After his football career, Pieter applied his leadership skills into a



successful career in sales, eventually joining Jim Pattison Lease in 2015 as the Regional Sales Director of the Pacific Region. Jim Pattison Lease, a proud member of the Jim Pattison Group, offers vehicle leasing and fleet management solutions to public and commercial sector enterprises. This award has been established to celebrate Pieter's determination to elevate and uplift those around him. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Athletics Awards Committee. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).

Liu Shiming Scholarship in Arts

Scholarships totalling \$4,000 have been made available through an endowment established by the Liu Shiming Art Foundation for graduate students in the Department of Art History, Visual Art and Theory. Preference will be given to students studying Art History. As well as preserving the works of acclaimed Chinese artist Liu Shiming, the Liu Shiming Art Foundation supports students around the world in order to advance global discourse surrounding arts, history and culture, with the specific aim of fostering a greater understanding and appreciation of Asian art forms within a global context. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Department of Art History, Visual Art and Theory, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Peter and Phyllis Suedfeld Gaudeamus Igitur Award in Opera

Awards totalling \$1,750 have been made available through an endowment established by Dr. Peter Suedfeld, OC and Dr. Phyllis Johnson through the Peter Suedfeld Family Fund for undergraduate and graduate students in the Opera program at the School of Music who demonstrate exceptional promise in the field of Opera. Recipients are selected on the basis of operatic talent. Peter, Dean Emeritus of Graduate Studies and Professor Emeritus of Psychology at UBC, has dedicated his career to the study of environmental and political psychology and stress resilience. Phyllis is a faculty member in the Department of Sociology where her research emphasizes the allocation of financial and human resources by families coping with stressful circumstances. They are both passionate supporters of higher education and of the art of opera. Peter's father was a musician who performed in opera orchestras in his native Hungary and elsewhere in Europe. Phyllis and Peter created this award to support the next generation of opera professionals, and named it the Gaudeamus Igitur Award, after the medieval academic song traditionally played at graduation ceremonies. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Chair of the Voice and Opera Divisions and in the case of a graduate student, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Bing Thom Undergraduate Award in Architecture



Awards totalling \$3,500 have been made available through an endowment established by the Architecture Foundation of BC in collaboration with the Bing Thom Foundation, in memory of Bing Thom (1940–2016), for fourth-year undergraduate students in the Bachelor of Design in Architecture, Landscape Architecture and Urbanism program who demonstrate creativity, innovative thinking and recognize the transformative potential of architecture to inspire communities to act and grow. Bing (B.Arch. 1966, M.Arch., LL.D. 2008) established Bing Thom Architects in 1982 and the Bing Thom Foundation. His urban designs transformed Whalley, BC with SFU Central City, and Fort Worth, Texas with the Trinity Uptown Plan, Tarrant County College, and Trinity River Flood Plain. His posthumous works are the Woodridge Library in Washington, DC, the Allard Hall at MacEwan University in Edmonton, the SFU Sustainable Energy Engineering Building in Surrey, the Xi Qu Theatre Hong Kong, the University of Chicago in Hong Kong, and the Butterfly in Vancouver. Bing received the 2011 Royal Architectural Institute of Canada Gold Medal. The awards are made on the recommendation of the School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Henry and Irene Ward Centennial Scholars Award

Renewable entrance awards totalling \$9,600 have been made available through an endowment established by Gerald Weeks, in memory of Henry (1893–1948) and Irene Ward (1917–2003), for outstanding domestic students entering directly from secondary school or transferring from another post-secondary institution. Recipients are academically qualified and would not be able to attend UBC without financial assistance. In addition to academic merit, consideration is given to qualities such as leadership skills, community service and recognized extra-curricular achievement. Preference will be given to students from single-parent families. Subject to continued good academic standing, the awards will be renewed for a further three years of study or until the first undergraduate degree is obtained (whichever comes first). Gerald Weeks, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Microbiology and Immunology at UBC, grew up in a single-parent family in England with his mother, Irene Ward and grandfather, Henry Ward who instilled in him the importance of education and social justice. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Centennial Scholars Entrance Award Committee. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).

NEW AWARDS – ANNUAL

Andrew Aziz Graduate Award in Chemical and Biological Engineering

Awards totalling \$10,000 have been made available annually through a gift from Andrew Aziz for outstanding international graduate students in the Department of Chemical and Biological



Engineering who demonstrate active engagement in entrepreneurial activities, leadership and innovation. Along with being the founder and CEO of Peak Capital Trading and a Forbes Council official member, Andrew is also a Canadian trader, fund manager and author. The award signifies the opportunities and new horizons available to international students who begin a new life in Canada. Andrew created this award to support daring and innovative students who have the courage to start anew, harnessing their engineering background to leap into entrepreneurship and business. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Department of Chemical and Biological Engineering, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Backman Family Travel Award in Forestry

Two \$5,000 awards have been made available annually through a gift from Charles Backman to support undergraduate students in the Faculty of Forestry attending an international Forestry Field School or the Haida Gwaii Semester program who demonstrate an interest in conflict resolution processes. Preference will be given to students who have demonstrated financial need. The Backman family's links to the BC forestry industry go back to the early 1900s with his grandfather, Carl Backman. Charles' parents Arvid "Bill" Backman (1919–1998) and Elizabeth Backman (1923–2016) attended UBC. Bill (B.A.Sc. 1943, M.F. 1993) served as Treasurer of the AMS and Elizabeth (B.A. 1945, B.S.W. 1946) received the 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada Medal in recognition of her volunteer work. In the last 50 years, Charles has earned six university degrees, showcasing a lifelong commitment to learning. He earned a B.Sc. in Forestry and an M.B.A. from UBC, an M.A. in International Studies and a Ph.D. from the University of Washington, a Ph.D. from the University of Calgary, and an M.Sc. in Quantitative Finance from the University of London in 2023. He has had a long career in academia and forest resource management. Charles established this award to help students develop conflict resolution skills through exploring international and intercultural issues in forestry, focusing on social and political aspects. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Forestry. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Sean Barron and Family Award in Accounting

A \$7,500 award has been made available annually by Sean Barron for third- or fourth-year Bachelor of Commerce students with a specialization in Accounting. Recipients must demonstrate financial need and community involvement. Sean (B.Com. 1997) is a proud UBC alum who looks back on his academic years with fondness and credits the faculty and staff he encountered for preparing him for a career that began in public accounting and led to the hedge fund industry. The award is made on the recommendation of the UBC Sauder School of Business. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).



Vancouver Canucks Alumni Foundation Thunderbird Award in Women's Hockey

Awards totalling \$5,000, which may range from a minimum value of \$500 each to the maximum allowable under athletic association regulations, have been made available annually through a gift from the Vancouver Canucks Alumni Foundation for outstanding members of the UBC Women's Varsity Hockey team in any year of study. Preference will be given to students who are from BC. The Vancouver Canucks Alumni Foundation is composed of former NHL players, hockey supporters, coaches and staff. The Foundation supports hockey across British Columbia by organizing events, fundraising and providing scholarships for players who wish to pursue post-secondary education. This award has been established in honour of Carol L. Wasylyk. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Athletic Awards Committee. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Dorothy Margaret Covello Memorial Award in Pharmaceutical Sciences

Awards totalling \$6,000 have been made available annually through a gift from The Covello Family Charitable Fund, in memory of Dorothy Margaret Covello (née Smithers), for outstanding domestic students entering the first-year of the Bachelor of Pharmaceutical Sciences program who demonstrate participation in extracurricular activities. Preference will be given to students entering from a high school in Northern BC or from a rural area in BC. Dorothy (1931–1965) was born in Vanderhoof and was a high school graduate from Prince George. She completed her Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy at UBC in 1953. Her husband Tom, originally from Thorold, Ontario, was dedicated to his work on construction projects in Western Canada. Tragically, they both lost their lives in the CP Flight 21 crash at 100 Mile House in July 1965. To honour Dorothy's memory, the award has been established to support future students in Pharmaceutical Sciences, encouraging them to pursue their dreams with the same passion and commitment that she exemplified. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

CPA Education Foundation of BC Peter Norwood DAP Award

Awards totalling \$5,000 have been made available annually through a gift from the Chartered Professional Accountants' Education Foundation (CPAEF) of BC, along with matching funds from the University of British Columbia, in honour of Peter Norwood, for students enrolled in the Diploma in Accounting Program (DAP). Recipients must demonstrate financial need and be intent on pursuing the Chartered Professional Accountant designation. Preference will be given to international students. A dedicated and highly regarded instructor for over 20 years, Peter Norwood, FCPA, FCA, FCMA played an instrumental role in the creation of UBC's Diploma in Accounting Program. This award honors his contributions and efforts to advance and develop



educational pathways and programs for chartered professional accountants. CPAEF aims to support and advance business and accounting education across BC by enhancing the quality and quantity of students entering the accounting profession. The awards are made on the recommendation of the UBC Sauder School of Business, in consultation with the Diploma in Accounting Program. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Earthshot Foundation's Terranaut Graduate Scholarship in Forestry

Scholarships totalling \$20,000 have been made available annually through a gift from Earthshot Foundation for outstanding graduate students entering the TRANSFOR-M (Transatlantic Forestry Master) program. Ordinarily, each award will be valued at \$10,000 per year and renewed for a second year, conditional on the recipient's continued satisfactory academic progress. The Earthshot Foundation, established in 2008, is dedicated to environmental preservation, clean energy transition and designing sustainable systems. The term "Terranaut" is central to the Foundation's mission, representing individuals who are dedicated to exploring and protecting Earth's ecosystems. The Foundation is establishing this award to support students' commitment and dedication to fostering the preservation and sustainable management of forests, which are vital for sustaining environmental balance and enhancing the welfare of communities. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Forestry, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).

EXP Award in Civil Engineering

Awards totalling \$2,000 have been made available annually through a gift from EXP Services Inc. for domestic second-, third- or fourth-year Bachelor of Applied Science students in Civil Engineering who demonstrate outstanding academic achievement and outstanding leadership in extra- and/or co-curricular activities. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need. Operating out of over 90 offices and labs in North America, EXP provides engineering, architecture, design and consulting services to built and natural environments. With one of these locations in Burnaby, BC, EXP is proud to support UBC students in their journey through higher education. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Applied Science. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Talha Faran Memorial Bursary in Pharmaceutical Sciences

Bursaries totalling \$2,000 have been made available annually through a gift from family, in memory of Talha Faran (1999–2024), for students in the Bachelor of Pharmaceutical Sciences program. Talha was passionate about pharmaceutical sciences. He enjoyed two years in the Doctor of Pharmacy program and worked as a pharmacy intern. He cherished the time he spent



with his family and friends. Talha's family is establishing this award to support students who share the same passion and commitment Talha had for the field of pharmacy. The bursaries are adjudicated by Enrolment Services. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

GHD Foundation Award in Engineering for Indigenous Students

Awards totalling \$3,125 have been made available annually through a gift from GHD Foundation for First Nations, Inuit, or Métis students of Canada in second-, third-, or fourth-year of the Bachelor of Applied Science program. Preference will be given to students who are in third-year and demonstrate financial need. Established in 1928, GHD is a global network of multi-disciplinary professionals providing clients with integrated solutions through engineering, environmental, design, and construction expertise. In 2020, the GHD Foundation was established with a focus on promoting equitable access to science, technology, engineering, the arts, and mathematics (STEAM) education. The foundation aims to foster a more diverse workforce, promote diversity and expand access for underrepresented individuals in these fields. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Applied Science. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Paul Gill Award in Entrepreneurship

A \$2,000 award has been made available annually by Paul Gill (B.Com. 2011) for a Bachelor of Commerce student with a specialization in Entrepreneurship who demonstrates innovation and an exceptional work ethic. Preference will be given to a Canadian citizen with financial need. Paul, the Founder and CEO of Naked & Saucy, left his corporate position at a marketing company to establish his own cooking sauce business which values nutritious and ethically sourced ingredients. By establishing this award, Paul hopes to support the next generation of entrepreneurs and celebrate their initiative. The award is made on the recommendation of the UBC Sauder School of Business. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Ruth P. Glenen MBA Entrance Award for Women

Two \$35,000 entrance awards have been made available annually in memory of Ruth P. Glenen through a gift from 11:11 Charitable Foundation for outstanding domestic students who are women entering the Master of Business Administration program. Ruth (B.A., M.B.A.) worked as an executive assistant at Nesbitt Thomson while attending night classes to obtain her B.A. in 1980 and M.B.A. in 1985 from Concordia University. She forged an impressive career in venture capital, mentored many young women and advocated for women's education. The foundation established this award to honour Ruth's legacy, support women in business, and foster a mutually supportive and self-sustaining network of recipients and future collaborators. The



awards are made on the recommendation of the Robert H. Lee Graduate School. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).

Sally Yue Lin Award in Population and Public Health

Awards totalling \$2,000 have been made available annually through a gift from Sally Yue Lin (M.P.H. 2015) for domestic students in the School of Population and Public Health with disabilities related to neurodiversity and/or mental health. Preference will be given to Master of Public Health students. When she was a student, Sally received a transformational award that enabled her to have career opportunities that she would not otherwise have been able to afford. Since graduating from UBC, Sally established a career coaching service alongside her career in health research, public policy, and program implementation. This service focuses specifically on supporting equity-deserving professionals to find and retain their desired work. While she is aware that one award cannot address all the challenges that students with disabilities related to neurodiversity and/or mental health may face during their studies, Sally hopes that this award can alleviate some of the financial pressures that compound these disabilities, while honouring her clients, colleagues, and friends who have had similar experiences in the process. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Committee on Awards for Students with Disabilities. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Monarch Pediatric Dental Centre Graduate Community Achievement Award

A \$2,000 award has been made available annually through a gift from Monarch Pediatric Dental Centre for a master's student in a Pediatric Dentistry program who demonstrates outstanding community involvement during their clinical rotation at the Monarch Pediatric Dental Centre. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Dentistry, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Parkland NITEP Award

Five awards of \$5,000 each have been made available annually through a gift from Parkland Refining for First Nations, Inuit or Métis students enrolled in the Indigenous Teacher Education Program (NITEP) program who demonstrate financial need. Parkland Refining is a Canadian convenience store operator and independent petroleum products and fuel retailing company based out of Calgary, Alberta. The company serves customers across Canada, the United States, the Caribbean region and Central and South America through a large portfolio of diverse brands. Parkland Refining is involved with electric vehicle charging, renewable fuels, solar energy and compliance and carbon offset trading. The



awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Education's Indigenous Education Department. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

SAG Conference Award Foundation Graduate Award in Mining Engineering

Awards totalling \$25,000 have been made available annually through a gift from SAG Conference Award Foundation for outstanding Faculty of Applied Science graduate students studying mining engineering who demonstrate an interest in the study and field of comminution. The SAG Conference Award Foundation supports the advancement of knowledge and education in comminution and related areas. They created this award to encourage the next generation of engineers and researchers to contribute to the industry's growth and innovation. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Norman B. Keevil Institute of Mining Engineering, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Jerry Sauder Memorial Award in Women's Soccer

Awards totalling \$6,000, ordinarily valued at \$3,000 each, have been made available annually through a gift from the Doug and Trudy Peden Foundation, in memory of Jerry Sauder (1948–2021), for members of the UBC Thunderbirds Women's Soccer team, in any year of study, who demonstrate an exceptional work ethic, outstanding performance and commitment to their team. Jerry (LL.B. 1972), a previous President of the Doug and Trudy Peden Foundation, was active in community affairs in BC. As well as participating in several fundraising committees, foundation boards and organizations, he served as President of the Union Club of BC from 1998 to 1999. This award has been named in Jerry's memory to reflect his significant contributions to the Doug and Trudy Peden Foundation and his hard-working values. Passionate about supporting female athletes, the Doug and Trudy Peden Foundation was established in honour of Doug, an exceptional Canadian athlete and sports editor, and his wife Trudy after her passing. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Athletics Awards Committee. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Dedar Sihota Memorial Bursary in Education

Bursaries totalling \$16,500 have been made available annually, in memory of Dedar Sihota (1924–2022), for undergraduate students in the Faculty of Education. Dedar (B.A. 1949, B.Ed. 1958) immigrated to Canada from India at the age of 12. He attended UBC and overcame many barriers to become a teacher in British Columbia. Throughout his teaching career, he served as a Counsellor, Vice-Principal and Principal. In retirement, he and his wife, Joyce, successfully operated a blueberry farm. Dedar contributed to the community as a Commissioner of Parks and Recreation as well as a board member of various organizations. This award was established to



honour his lifelong dedication to teaching, mentorship, and community service, and ensure his legacy continues to inspire future educators. The bursaries are adjudicated by Enrolment Services. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Joyce Sihota Memorial Bursary in Social Work

Bursaries totalling \$16,500 have been made available annually, in memory of Joyce Sihota (1925–2017), for undergraduate students in the School of Social Work. Born in Peace River, Alberta, Joyce (B.A. 1946, B.S.W. 1947) completed her studies at UBC before becoming the director of Camp Alexandra, in Crescent Beach. Later, she and her husband Dedar successfully operated a blueberry farm, where Joyce chaired the BC Blueberry Council. In addition to her work helping children and families at Camp Alexandra and with the BC Blueberry Council, Joyce remained deeply devoted to her own family of seven children. This award was established to honour her lifelong commitment to community service and social work, and inspire future generations to carry on her legacy of dedication and compassion. The bursaries are adjudicated by Enrolment Services. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Stone Ph.D. Fellowship in Wealth and Income Inequality

Fellowships totalling \$200,000 have been made available annually through a gift from the James M. and Cathleen D. Stone Foundation for doctoral students in the Vancouver School of Economics entering their third year or higher, whose research and studies are related to income and wealth inequality. Ordinarily, each award will be valued at \$20,000 per year and renewed for a second year, conditional on the recipient's continued satisfactory academic progress. The Stone Centre on Wealth and Income Inequality, established by the James M. and Cathleen D. Stone Foundation, created these fellowships to support students and advance research related to income disparity and economic inequality in our societies. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Vancouver School of Economics, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Ilmar Weemees Memorial Award in Civil Engineering

Awards totalling \$2,500 have been made available annually through a gift from ConeTec, in memory of Ilmar A. Weemees (1964–2024), for graduate students in the Department of Civil Engineering who demonstrate an interest in in-situ testing and/or geophysical methods for solving geotechnical programs. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate strong collaboration skills. Ilmar (B.A.Sc. 1987, M.A.Sc. 1990) joined ConeTec in May 1989 and introduced a technique still widely used by the company today. He developed early data processing software and innovative testing methods, shaping ConeTec's use of geophysical techniques both on land and underwater. His expertise in in-situ testing and geophysical



techniques contributed to ConeTec's ongoing innovation and success in the field. The award was created to honour Ilmar's significant contributions and dedication to geotechnical engineering. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Department of Civil Engineering, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. (First award available for the 2024/2025 winter session).

Tomas Yebes Award in Law

Awards totalling \$2,000 have been made available annually through gifts from counsel Richard Fowler, KC, Don Sorochnan, KC, and Marilyn Sandford, KC, in honour of Tomas Yebes, for students in the J.D. program who have made exceptional contributions to the UBC Innocence Project. Tomas was wrongfully convicted for the murder of his two sons in 1983 and was exonerated after nearly 40 years through the work of counsel, expert witnesses and students from the UBC Innocence Project at the Peter A. Allard School of Law. This award celebrates Tomas' remarkable humility and unwavering determination in proving his innocence. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Peter A. Allard School of Law. (First award available for the 2025/2026 winter session).
