Remarks from the Chair and Related Questions

COUNCIL OF SENATES

The President reported that the inaugural meeting of the Council of Senates was held on March 17, 2006. The Council was charged with creating and reporting their rules and procedures within one year. The Council, under advisement from the Joint Committee, was tasked with the item of establishing Council membership, to be reported back to the Council in May 2006. The Council members questioned how affiliation agreements, i.e., Enowkin Affliliation Agreement, will be considered and communicated between the UBC Senates. The President expressed the importance of the Council meeting as a historical event.

RECENT TRIPS

The President reported that she travelled to Ottawa and Toronto. Alumni gatherings in those cities were very successful. Presentations to alumni were given by renowned UBC Alumni: Jeffrey Simpson (Globe and Mail), Michael Byers (Liu Institute), and Richard Johnson (UBC Vancouver). The President stated that it was evident from the alumni questions that UBC Alumni are interested to learn more about UBC Okanagan.

The President shared her optimism with the new government's commitment to funding university research in Ottawa; their current \$500 million investment for research and universities is evidence of this commitment.

PROFESSOR CARL E. WIEMAN

The President acknowledged the January 2007 appointment of Nobel Laureate, Professor Wieman, to The University of British Columbia. The President expressed her enthusiasm for Professor Wieman's work in physics, and her pleasure of the fact that he will call UBC

home. Professor Wieman will be supported to advance the teaching of science and to prepare students to understand science at both UBC campuses.

NEW UBC PRESIDENT

The President shared the Board of Governors announcement of the July 1, 2006 appointment of UBC's 12th University President. The President invited Okanagan Senate members to meet with the new President at 3:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 22nd.

Remarks from the Acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Related Questions

The Acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor shared his belief that Professor Wieman will influence both UBC campuses through his innovations.

Acting Deputy-Vice Chancellor Tees discussed his presentation of the UBC Okanagan Master Plan to the Board of Governors on March 20, 2006. The Board of Governors approved a one-year accelerated, August 2006 occupancy date. The Board of Governors agreed that the Master Plan is doable and that UBC Okanagan has a good handle on its development. However, to address the need for temporary space, the Board approved an additional 2,000 square meters to be added to a current building. The total investment into the master plan is \$240 million; the Province will invest \$105 million of the total cost.

Admissions and Awards Committee

Dr. Bassett-Smith presented the Committe's report.

The Admissions and Awards Committee had circulated a recommendation to approve admissions changes for the Faculty of Health and Social Development, and from the Undergraduate Admissions office.

Dr. Bassett-Smith Dr. Cioe

That Senate approve the admissions proposals as listed in the Committee report and as proposed by the Faculty of Health and Social Work and the Undergraduate Admissions office.

DISCUSSION

Dean Belton inquired as to whether the *Admission from Post-Secondary Institutions* offering different B.S.N. Curriculum proposal paragraph enclosed in bold should be placed at the front of the calendar to represent other UBC Okanagan programs. So as to unduly delay the Nursing proposal, Acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor Tees offered that a general statement be considered for application to other faculties and schools:

"It is important to note that the curriculum of the Nursing program at UBC Okanagan is different from the curriculum of the Nursing program at UBC Vancouver. Direct transfer between the two programs is not possible."

Dr. Cioe questioned the rationale in dropping the math competency test in the *L.P.N. to B.S.N. Admissions Requirements* proposal. Dr. Bassett-Smith verified that the School of Nursing at UBC Okanagan is aligning the program requirement with UBC Vancouver's Nursing program, which does not require a math competency test.

The motion was put and carried.

Curriculum Committee

Dr. Salhani, as Chair, of the Committee, presented the Committee's report.

The Acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor confirmed that the additional student senator could be either a graduate or undergraduate student. Mr. Eaton advised Dr. Labun that a motion to accept the Dean of Graduate Studies is unnecessary; since the Dean is considered an Administrator, the addition of the recommended faculty and student members will counterbalance this consideration. Ms. Collins noted that the *University Act* allows the Senate to add seats to the membership.

The motion was put and carried.

REFERRAL TO THE COUNCIL OF SENATE

Mr. Eaton verified that the motion to approve the Referral to the Council of Senates document would not take effect unless the UBC Vancouver Senate established and maintaind a rule to the same effect.

Subject: Referral to the Council of Senates

Dear Mr. Silzer:

As you are aware, at its meeting of February 17, 2006, the Okanagan Senate approved, in principle, the conferral of UBC degrees on a group of alumni of the former Okanagan University College (OUC).

Following that approval in principle, members of the Vancouver Senate requested that the Vancouver Senate consider a motion to refer the matter of conferral of these degrees to the Council of Senates for final decision.

Upon reflection, I have decided that the best course of action is to exercise the power accorded the president under the *University Act*, R.S.B.C. 1996, c. 468, s. 38.2(1) and personally refer the matter of the granting of UBC degrees to alumni of Okanagan University College to the Council of Senates for disposition.

Under the *University Act*, each of the Vancouver and Okanagan Senates has the power to "...provide for and grant degrees[.]" Under normal circumstances, I expect that each of the Senates will approve the conferral of its campus's respective degrees. However, I believe the matter of granting degrees to OUC alumni constitutes an exception to this norm.

To determine whether to make this referral, I considered the unique historical relationship between UBC Vancouver and OUC. During the 1990s OUC offered degree

programs that were largely based on UBC curricula and taught by faculty approved by UBC. Students graduating from these programs were awarded degrees granted under UBC authority until 1998, when OUC began offering its own degrees. As a result, 1) UBC Vancouver was directly involved with the degree granting status of OUC through 1998, and 2) the contemplated decision about the conferral of UBC degrees only affects approximately 2,381 OUC alumni who graduated between 1998 and 2005.

I also considered the unique post-transition relationship that exists between OUC and UBC Okanagan. Many of our UBC Okanagan students, faculty, and staff began at OUC and have been instrumental in the establishment and growth of UBC Okanagan.

Given these historical and current circumstances, OUC alumni clearly enjoy a connection with UBC. Accordingly, I believe the Council of Senates is best positioned to determine whether UBC degrees should be granted to this unique group of OUC alumni who both succeed OUC alumni who already possess degrees granted under UBC Vancouver authority and precede alumni who will possess degrees granted under UBC Okanagan authority.

As such, I am referring the matter of granting of UBC degrees to OUC alumni graduating from 1998 through 2005 to the Council of Senates for disposition. The Council's disposition of this matter will be reported to both the Okanagan and Vancouver Senates when it is resolved.

- 2) Add the new Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT I) or the American College Test (ACT) plus the Writing component to the requirements for applicants presenting the American secondary school curriculum as their basis of admission.

Rationale: The Sub-Committee on the SAT, which has representatives from both UBC Vancouver and UBC Okanagan, jointly recommends that this proposal be approved at both UBC Vancouver and UBC Okanagan, with consistent language for both campuses.

The sub-committee's recommendation is that the SAT I or the ACT + Writing be required as part of the selection process for applicants following the American secondary school curriculum both in the United States and abroad. These standardized tests

or

ACT (26 or higher) + Writing (10 or higher).

In countries where the SAT and ACT are unavailable, exemptions may be granted.

would be used in addition to the GPA and, in cases where academic performance is marginal, other performance indicators may be considered.

Results from the SAT I and ACT + Writing, in combination with an admission GPA, have been shown by other institutions to be a better indicator of university performance than either of these factors on their own. Use of these tests will also help to offset UBC concerns regarding inconsistency in grading and/or rigor of curriculum across different schools offering the American secondary curriculum.

In reaching this recommendation, the subcommittee carefully reviewed and considered the new SAT, its correlation to ACT results, standards and practices at peer institutions in Canada and the United States, and the correlation between performance and SAT results for UBC students who have presented the SAT in past. The College Board and the ACT organization were consulted, as were Admissions professionals at peer institutions.

The Senate Admissions Committee for UBC Vancouver approved is proposal on March 8, 2006. The Admissions Office and the SAT Sub-Committee request approval from the Admissions and Awards Committee and the Senates of both Campus' in order to ensure consistent language across both UBC campuses.

Given that we compete with other academic institutions for qualified applicants in making timely offers of admission, this policy will negatively impact internal applicants seeking to change their degree program to the Bachelor of Social Work. Competitor institutions with early offers of admission require registration deposits, and without a decision from UBC-Okanagan, applicants often take up those other offers.

By comparison, the admission process for an external/non-UBC applicant allows for evaluation of applications on the basis of interim grades and a subsequent firm offer of admission if eligible. This offer is converted to a final offer of admission once final transcripts indicating course completion have been received.

The School of Social Work requires that internal applicants be evaluated for degree changes on the basis of interim grades, and, if eligible, be made a firm offer of admission. 

Please be advised that on 30 March 2006, royal assent was granted to bill 15, a *Miscellaneous Statutes Amendment Act*, which amended the *University Act* in the following ways:

- 1) Section 20 was amended to correct the typographical error in the recent *University Amendment Act* that set the terms for student members of university boards of governors as three years instead of the intended one year. These terms have been restored to their original and intended length.
- 2) Section 23 (1) (c) was repealed, thus persons who are not Canadian citizens nor permanent residents may now sit on boards of governors.
- 3) Section 36 was amended to correct several typographical errors in the recent *University Act Amendment Act* that set the terms for student members of university senates as three years instead of the intended one year. These terms have been restored to their original and intended length.

The approved text from the legislation is set out below for greater clarity:

44 Section 20 of the University Act, R.S.B.C. 1996, c. 468, is amended

- (a) by repealing subsection (1) and substituting the following:
- (1) Each member of the board elected under section 19 (1) (c) and (f) and (2) (c), (d), (h) and (i) holds office for 3 years and after that until a successor is elected.
- (1.1) Each member of the board appointed under section 19 (1) (d) and (2) (e) holds office for a term of up to 3 years and after that until a successor is appointed. , and
- **(b)** in subsection **(2)** by striking out "section 19 (e)" and substituting "section 19 (1) (e) or (2) (f) or (g)".
- 45 Section 23 (1) (c) is repealed.
- 46 Section 36 is amended
- (a) in subsections (1) and (2) by striking out "section 35 (2) (h)" and substituting "section 35 (2) (h) or 35.1 (2) (h) or (3) (h)", and
- **(b) in subsection (3) by striking out** "section 35" **in both places and substituting** "section 35 or 35.1".

Re: Requested Changes to the *University Act*

Recently, both the *Review of Senate* (Vancouver) and the joint *Council of Senates Review* Committees have recommended that Senate endorse changes to the *University Act*. Set out below please find a list of those requested changes and recommendations on how we believe Senate should proceed. This report is being issued to both Senates for their consideration. As such, in accordance with the system-wide document approved last meeting, we request that it either be approved, divided, referred, or rejected; but not amended.

From the Review of Senate Committee:

Recommendation 1:

Section 35.1 (2) (b): That Senate be allowed to elect its own Chair.

Recommendation: That no action be taken on this item until the views of the

President-designate can be considered. Consultation is

currently in progress.

From the joint Council of Senates Review Committees:

Recommendation 2:

Section 38.2 (1): That the Council of Senates not have the power to self-refer

matters under the jurisdiction of a Senate.

Recommendation: That Senate request that the President and the administration

propose this change to the Ministry of Advanced Education.

Recommendation 3:

Section 38.2 (2) (c): That the Council of Senates no longer have the power to

substitute its disposition for one made by a Senate.

Recommendation: In consultation with the University Counsel, we do not

recommend any action on this item. We further note that it is this section that allows the Council to make a decision on any legitimate item referred to it, and without such a power, the role of "final arbiter" of system-wide disputes cannot be

fufilled by the Council.

Recommendation 4:

Section 38.2 (4) That the powers set out in Section 37 (1) (o)

[recommendations to the Board], and (u) [affiliation

agreements] be returned to campus-based Senates, and that the powers set out in Section 37 (1) (1) [management of the

library] be given to the Council of Senates.

Recommendation: We recommend that Senate request that the President and the

administration propose to the Ministry of Advanced Education that Section 37 (1) (o) be left within the powers of the Council of Senates, but that corresponding powers also be granted to each Senate, and that paragraph (l) be given to the Council of Senates in recognition of the system-wide nature of the UBC Library. We do not recommend any changes to the provisions for affiliation agreements, as we also note that these are

system-wide decisions as affiliation is not established with any

UBC campus, but rather with UBC as a whole.

Recommendation 5:

Section 38.1 (4) That a member of the Council of Senates representing a Senate

be removed from the Council if they cease to be a member of

their Senate.

Recommendation: That Senate request that the President and the administration

propose this change to the Ministry of Advanced Education.

Recommendation 6:

Senates for Convocation and Student Senators.

Recommendation: At this time, we do not recommend any action as we note that

the Council of Senates has struck a committee to consider its

membership generally.

Recommendation 7:

Section 38.1 (3) That students on the Council of Senates be limited to terms of

1 year instead of the usual 3 (a parallel to the Senate term

lengths).

Recommendation: That Senate request that the President and the administration

propose this change to the Ministry of Advanced Education.

In regards to those matters where the Senates have requested changes to the Act, we further request that the University Counsel report to the Senates by September 2006 on any actions the University has taken in regards to Senates' proposals.

Re: Policy on Emeritus Appointments

INTRODUCTION

The Policies and Procedures Committee was recently referred the matter of recommending whether emeritus faculty members of Okanagan University College (OUC) should be granted emeritus status at UBC Okanagan. The Committee takes the view that it would be appropriate for such a recommendation to be made in the context of an overall policy for emeritus status at UBC Okanagan. The Committee has considered the matter and its report is given below. For background, the current UBC Vancouver Emeritus Policy, and the OUC Emeritus Policy are first summarized. In this context, a policy for UBC Okanagan Emeritus Policy is then proposed, with such policy accounting for the granting of emeritus status to OUC emeriti.

UBC VANCOUVER EMERITUS POLICY

At its January 2006 meeting, the Vancouver Senate amended its emeritus policy. The policy as amended may be summarized as follows:

Emeritus status is a recognition conferred upon individuals who are retired from UBC Vancouver but permitted to retain as an honorary title the rank held at retirement as set out in the following criteria.

Criteria for Emeritus Status

In order to be eligible to be recommended to Senate by the Tributes Committee for emeritus status, an individual must:

 Have a combined age at retirement plus years of full-time service to the University of 70 or more, and

- Have held a full-time Tenure, Tenure-track, Grant Tenure or Grant Tenure-track position at the rank of Assistant, Associate or Full Professor or Instructor. In addition, Librarians and Program Directors must have held a Confirmed appointment.
- Individuals holding Clinical appointments in the Faculty of Medicine must have had 15 years of continuous service to qualify.
- A Chancellor completing his/her elected term(s) is automatically recommended for emeritus status.
- Senate, at its discretion, may decide under exceptional circumstances, not to recommend emeritus status or to revoke emeritus status from an individual.

Privileges

Privileges granted to emeriti at UBC Vancouver include the following:

- Free parking
- Office and/or research space as available and subject to Department approval and arrangements
- Dependent children entitled to tuition waivers

OUC EMERITUS POLICY

The most recent OUC Emeritus Policy for faculty members included the following criteria and privileges:

Criteria

• Established record of scholarship or similar appropriate level of achievement

Privileges

- As resources permit, access to library, secretarial, technical, computing services, and parking
- Office and/or research space made available by Dean in consultation with department

An analogous policy was in place for Emeritus Administrators.

PROPOSED OKANAGAN SENATE POLICY

The Committee has attempted to conform to the Vancouver policy to the extent practicable, but modified as necessary to suit the circumstances of the Okanagan campus.

Description of Emeritus Status

Emeritus status is a recognition conferred upon individuals who have retired from UBC Okanagan but who are permitted to retain as an honorary title the rank held at retirement as set

out in the following criteria and with the following titles. In contrast to the practice at some other universities, in which emeritus status may be awarded on a selective basis, UBC Okanagan currently awards this status to all who meet basic (although subject to change) eligibility requirements related to age, rank, and years of service. The title confers certain university privileges and carries an implicit connotation of merit.

Criteria for Emeritus Status

Emeritus status is a recognition conferred upon individuals who have retired from UBC Okanagan but who are permitted to retain an honorary title for life. It is granted to those who meet the following criteria:

- Have a combined age at retirement plus years of full-time service to the University of 70 or more, and
- Have held a full-time Tenure, Tenure-track, Grant Tenure or Grant Tenure-track position at the rank of Assistant, Associate or Full Professor or Instructor for a minimum of five years.
- In meeting the above criteria, full account will be taken of previous appointments at Okanagan University College or at UBC Vancouver.
- Those individuals who held emeritus status at Okanagan University College on June 30, 2005, and who held a faculty appointment at OUC for a minimum of three years will be invited to accept emeritus status at UBC Okanagan.
- Until such time that subjective criteria for granting emeritus status are developed, and that due processes for the denial or revocation of emeritus status are developed and approved by the Okanagan Senate, emeritus appointments to be approved by Senate on the basis of the current non-subjective criteria only.

The Committee intends to bring forward by March 2007 for Senate's consideration revisions to the Policy that may include subjective criteria.

Titles

Emeritus status is granted with the title corresponding to the highest faculty rank an individual has held at UBC as follows: Instructor Emeritus, Assistant Professor Emeritus, Associate Professor Emeritus, and Professor Emeritus.

For OUC emeriti that are granted UBC Okanagan emeritus status, the title will correspond to the OUC emeritus title to the extent possible, but will be one of the following: Assistant Professor Emeritus, Associate Professor Emeritus or Professor Emeritus.

A former Deputy Vice Chancellor may express a preference to be granted instead the title Deputy Vice Chancellor Emeritus.

A former Dean who has served a minimum of five years may express a preference to be granted instead the title Dean Emeritus.

[In addition, the following system-wide emeritus appointments are automatically made: a former Chancellor is granted the title Chancellor Emeritus; and a former President is granted the title President Emeritus.]

Privileges

Privileges that may be afforded to emeritus faculty include:

- Free parking on the Okanagan campus
- Free library card
- Office and/or research space availability subject to approval of Dean and in consultation with the Department or School.
- Tuition waivers for emeriti under age 65 (any BC resident age 65 or older is eligible for free tuition)
- Tuition waivers for dependent children
- Membership in the Okanagan Association of Professors Emeriti
- [Currently, health benefits are afforded to all retirees after the age of 55].

It is noted that the privileges listed above do not lie within the jurisdiction of Senate, and that they may be modified at any time without referral to Senate.

PROCEDURES

In June and December of each year, the Senate Secretariat obtains from Faculty Relations and forwards to the Policies and Procedures Committee a list of retiring or resigning faculty members who meet the relevant criteria. The Committee considers the list and forwards it to Senate for final approval. The Secretary to Senate notifies faculty members of their emeritus status by letter following the Senate meeting.

With regard to OUC emeriti, upon Senate's approval of this report, the Registrar will develop a list of OUC emeriti that should be given the opportunity to accept UBC emeritus status. At the appropriate time, Senate will be requested to approve a corresponding motion in order to confer this status on those individuals that accept this status.
