also noted that the iMED fee shown for \$291.73 was only paid by International Students, and that domestic students would only pay \$121.73 for iMED fees, for a revised total of \$341.14, not the \$511.14 shown.

In response to a question from Dr. Phillion, Mr. Vogt confirmed that the fees shown represented the Summer Session and if the course was taken in the fall term, associated student fees would be higher.

Mr. Eaton addressed Senate, indicating that a similar situation exists at UBC Vancouver with respect to undergraduate researchers who also enroll in zero-credit courses. He indicated that the cost to the University for students enrolled in zero credit courses has been considered and that the current decision of the Board of Governors is to assess zero-credit courses as one-credit value. The Chair reminded Senate that the setting of fees was a Board decision and is out of scope of Senate; however, there is a mechanism available should the Okanagan and Vancouver Senates wish to convey a different position to the Board.

Curriculum Proposal - PSYO 452, PSYO 453

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Discussion

With the consent of Senate, Dr. Cioe spoke from the Chair on the matter.

In response to questions from Drs. Johnson, Phillion, and Dods, Dr. Cioe clarified that these courses would be required for students enrolled in Honours Psychology with a Specialization in Forensic Psychology, and that four to seven students may typically enroll. Dr. Cioe noted that the courses were being presented for approval in order to track and properly record under the correct authority, the practicum experience on the student transcripts in place of an unofficial certificate which was the current practice. It was acknowledged that adding these courses would incur an additional tuition fee for the students affected, but that a number of students have expressed concern over not having this program activity recorded on their transcripts when submitting applications to graduate studies.

Dr. Cioe offered to Senate the option of providing further information before the motion was resolved. Dr. Hilton suggested that the department could consider granting students in-house scholarships to cover the extra cost of the courses, to which Dr. Cioe replied that no revenue would be realized by the department as the tuition would be collected by the University. Dean Mathieson added that many other programs have program specializations and that there were protocols to be followed

for adding scholarships which needed to be in place for all future students wishing to take this specialization.

Dr. Tannant stated his concern that many zero-credit courses may exist on campus and that others may be added in the future, adding to the costs incurred by the students. Dr. Robinson inquired whether it was a concern to the Department that the zero-credit course was required yet seemed to be in excess of what was considered to be the maximum credit value for the program. Dean Bosetti enquired whether there was an option to delivering the program in a manner that gave credit value to the course. Dr. Hilton spoke and felt that the program design was not significantly different from that of a Co-operative program. Dr. Johnson spoke in favour of the motion, citing Senate's role in the approval of academic programs. Acting Dean Binsted spoke in favour of the motion as he felt that taking the courses provided a tangible benefit to students.

Dean Bosetti enquired whether there was a possibility to increase the total program credit value for the Honours program in order to accommodate the required courses and provide a credit value to them. Mr. Eaton was called to comment on the consequences of modifying an existing program to add credit beyond the approval framework already in place. Mr. Eaton called upon the Provost, who explained the rigorous nature by which the Provincial Government regulated and monitored any deviation in tuition fees charged by the University.

In response to a question from Dr. Dods, Dr. Cioe responded that credit program modifications are possible through the mechanisms provided by Senate and its associated Committees, and through the University Calendar. In response to a question, Mr. Ridge indicated that it was reasonably common across the University to have programs with different specializations that have different tuition fees associated with them.

Mr. Adl spoke in support of the courses being approved in alignment with those of other Honours Programs existing at the University, with credit being assigned to practicum courses and included in the count towards the overall program credits.

In response to a question from Dr. deScally, Dr. Cioe noted that there were both departmental costs and general University costs associated with delivering practicum courses. It was noted from the floor that there were other programs at the University which exceeded 120 credits. Dr. Cioe explained that the upward drift of program credits beyond the originally approved curriculum begins to raise questions when the same program is considered for transfer credit at other institutions.

In response to question from Dr. Dods, Mr. Ridge indicated that most zero-credit courses have varying costs to the University and the decision of the Board has been to establish a fee for zero-credit courses at a reasonable University-wide average.

BACKGROUND:

The main purposes of the proposed amendments to the existing versions of Policy #17 and Policy #18 (the "Existing Policies") are:

1. to reflect the re-organization of the Registrar's position from the Vice President, Students portfolio to both the Provost and Vice President Academic (UBC Vancouver) and Deputy Vice Chancellor and Principal (UBC Okanagan);

2. to increase faculty member representation on the advisory committees; and

3. to re-allocate the responsibility for selecting members on the advisory committees from the Council of Senates to other groups.

In addition, two related policies, Policy #24 - Extension of Appointments for Designated Senior Academic Administrators and Policy #43 - Extension of Appointments for Registrar and Librarians (the "Extension Policies") were recently amended. The proposed amendments have been structured so as to use structure, organization, and language that are consistent with the Extension Policies.



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CONSULTATION:

The Proposed Policies have received positive feedback from the Chair of the Council of Senates Executive Committee and the Vancouver Senate Academic Policy Committee. They are supported by the University Counsel, the President, the Provost and Vice President, Academic (UBC Vancouver) and the Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Principal (UBC Okanagan).

The proposed amendments were reviewed by the Nominating Committee of the Okanagan Senate, the Nominating Committee of the Vancouver Senate, and the Governance Committee of the Board of Governors in the autumn of 2011. No concerns were expressed by the Committees, so the University administration then engaged in a broader consultation process as follows:

• The proposed amendments were published on the University's website with a call for comments. The comment period was open from October 13, 2011 until November 30, 2011.

• The Office of the University Counsel sent an email highlighting key elements of the proposed amendments and inviting responses to the call for comments via the "HEADS UP" email list on both campuses to:

- o the UBC executive team;
- o associate vice presidents;
- o principals;
- o deans;
- o associate deans;
- o directors;
- o heads of units;

January 25, 2012



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- o student leaders; and
- o union leaders.

The proposed amendments appear to be uncontroversial, as they attracted very few comments, especially in comparison to some other policy proposals that were published during the same period. The few comments that were received were supportive of the amendments. The only change that resulted from the feedback is in Article 2.1 of the proposed Procedures for Policy #17, where the reference to the "Associate Vice-President, Learning Services (UBC Okanagan)" was amended to "Provost and Vice Principal (UBC Okanagan)" in order ot recognize the elimination of the former position from UBC Okanagan's organizational structure.

NEXT STEPS:

As the Existing Policies were jointly approved by the two Senates and the Board of Governors, the proposed amendments are being submitted to all three bodies simultaneously.

Upon approval of the proposed amendments by the Board of Governors and both of the Senates, the Office of the University Counsel will publish the revised versions of Policy #17 and Policy #18 on the University website and distribute the revised Policies to affected stakeholders.

The revised versions of Policy #17 and Policy #18 will then apply effective February 3, 2012, to all appointments made pursuant to the Policies for which the selection process has not yet commenced.

<u>POLICY TITLE: Appointment of Registrar and Librarians (Joint Senate and Board</u> <u>Policy)</u>

1. Governing Principles

- 1.1. Purpose: This Policy is intended to:
 - 1.1.1. comply with section 27(2)(f) of the University Act, R.S.B.C. 1996 c. 468 and, with the approval of the UBC Okanagan Senate and the UBC Vancouver Senate, to establish procedures for the selection and recommendation of candidates for the *Registrar* and *Librarians*; and
- **1.2.** Method: To succeed in this purpose this Policy:
 - 1.2.2. must be approved by the UBC Okanagan Senate, the UBC Vancouver Senate, and the Board of Governors, and not be amended without the same approvals; and
 - 1.2.3. will describe the creation of committees advising the President on recruitment and selection of the *Registrar* and the *University Librarian*, before the President makes a recommendation to the Board of Governors.
- 2. <u>Definitions and Interpretation Rules:</u> A schedule to this Policy establishes the definitions of terms used in this Policy and any unique rules of interpretation that apply to this Policy.
- 3. <u>Scope</u>

3.1. General:

- 3.1.1. This Policy applies to all appointments of the *Registrar*, the *University Librarian*, and all other *Librarians*.
- 3.1.2. *Librarians* other than the *University Librarian* are appointed in accordance with the Collective Agreement between the University and the Faculty Association.
- 3.1.3. The appointment of the *Registrar* and the appointment of the *University Librarian* are subject to the approval of the Board of Governors. The President shall provide advice and recommendations to the Board of Governors on the selection of the *Registrar* and the *University Librarian*.
- 3.1.4. Advisory Committees are to be established at the call of the President to consider candidates for an appointment as the Registrar and the University Librarian and to advise the President on recommendations to the Board of Governors.
- **3.2. Exclusions:** This Policy does not apply to appointments for positions other than the *Registrar* and *Librarians*.

4. Advisory Committees

4.1. President Convenes: For the selection of candidates for the *Registrar* and the *University Librarian*, the President shall convene an *Advisory Committee* to

consider and advise the President on the candidates before the President makes a recommendation to the Board of Governors ("*Advisory Committee*").

5. <u>University Librarian</u>

5.1. For the selection of the *University Librarian*, the President will convene an *Advisory Committee* with the following membership:

- **5.2. Student Member Elections:** For student members, the nominations and the elections are to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the *Registrar*. The *Registrar* may authorize a student society to conduct the nominations and/or elections processes on his or her behalf.
- **5.3. Senate Selections:** For Senators, the selection process is to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the relevant Senate. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Senate may authorize a committee (such as, for example, the Nominating Committee) to conduct the process or to simply nominate the Senators from that Senate.
- **5.4.** Appointment Term: The University Librarian may be appointed for up to 6 years per term.

6. <u>Registrar</u>

6.1. Registrar: For the selection of the *Registrar*, the President will convene an *Advisory Committee* with the following membership:

- **6.2. Student Member Elections:** For student members, the nominations and the elections are to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the Vice President, Students. The Vice President, Students may authorize the incumbent *Registrar* or another person or entity, including a student society to conduct the nominations and/or elections processes on his or her behalf, notwithstanding the fact that the incumbent *Registrar* may by a candidate for appointment.
- **6.3. Senate Selections:** For Senators, the selection process is to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the relevant Senate. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Senate may authorize a committee (such as, for example, the Nominating Committee) to conduct the process or to simply nominate the Senators from that Senate.
- **6.4.** Appointment Term: The *Registrar* may be appointed for up to 6 years per term.

7. <u>Replacement of Advisory Committee Members</u>

- 7.1. Vacancy or Inability to Participate: If a member of an Advisory Committee becomes unwilling or unable to serve as a member of the Advisory Committee before it has completed its work the President may appoint a replacement member in his/her discretion. While the replacement member may be any person whose participation is expected to contribute significantly to the Advisory Committee 's activities, the usual practice is for the President to replace a member from a stakeholder group with a person from that group. If the President does not appoint a replacement member, the Advisory Committee may complete its work notwithstanding the vacancy.
- 7.2. Student Status: If a student member of an *Advisory Committee* ceases to be a student at the University but remains willing and able to continue to serve as a member of the *Advisory Committee*, the President may permit the student to continue to serve or may appoint a replacement student member at his or her discretion.
- 8. Customary Practices: In making appointments to an *Advisory Committee*, including replacement appointments under Section 7, the President will consider gender balance.

9. Procedures Not to Conflict: Provided that they are not in conflict with this Policy, the Procedures associated with this Policy may be created and amended in the same way as the Procedures associated with any other Policy passed by the Board of Governors.

Title: Appointment of Registrar and Librarians (Joint Senate and Board Policy)

Schedule to Policy # 17 Definitions and Other Interpretation Rules

1. **Definitions**

In Policy # 17 - Appointment of Registrar and Librarians (Joint Senate and Board Policy), the following terms have the meaning defined below, and shall have the same meaning in any Procedures associated with that Policy:

- a. "Advisory Committee" means an advisory committee to the President as defined in section 4.1.
- b. "Librarians" means the members of UBC's professional librarian staff.
- c. "Registrar" means the Associate Vice President, Enrolment Services and Registrar.
- d. *"University Librarian"* means the person who is responsible for UBC's overall library system across both UBC Okanagan and UBC Vancouver.
- e. "Responsible Executive" means:
 - 1. individual(s) assigned by the President, from time to time, to be responsible for this Policy and any associated Procedures; and
 - 2. any sub-delegate of that assigned responsible individual(s) except to the extent that the power to delegate is specifically excluded in this Policy or in the appointment by the President.

PROCEDURES

1. <u>Responsible Executive</u>

- 1.1. **Appointment**: The individuals assigned by the President to be responsible for Policy #17 and these associated Procedures are the Provost and Vice President Academic (UBC Vancouver) and the Vice President, Students.
- 1.2. Sub-Delegation: The *Responsible Executives* are not limited in sub-delegation of the duties hereunder but remain responsible for oversight and answerable to the President.
- 2. <u>Remuneration</u>: The form and amount of remuneration of the *Registrar* and the *University Librarian* must be established and documented in writing at or before the effective date of the appointment.

3. Administrative Leaves

3.1. As part of the terms of an appointment, the University Librarian and the Registrar may be granted an administrative leave, to be taken at the conclusion of the appointment, provided however that any such grant of administrative leave as well as any remuneration and/or benefits to be received by the University Librarian or the Registrar during any such administrative leave must be documented in writing at or before the effective date of the appointment. Recognizing that administrative leave is intended to provide for a reasonable period of time for senior administrators who are returning the academic ranks to focus on their scholarly and professional activities and to re-integrate with their disciplines before they resume their regular duties as faculty members or Librarians, administrative leave will only be granted to the University Librarian

and the *Registrar* if they hold a tenured appointment and actually return to active duty as a faculty member or a *Librarian* for at least one year immediately after the period of the administrative leave.

- 3.2. Time on administrative leave will not be included in years of service for the purpose of calculating study leave.
- 3.3. Any arrangements with respect to administrative leave that that were established and documented in writing prior to February 1, 2008 will not be affected by these Procedures.
- 3.4. Any deviations from the provisions of these Procedures dealing with administrative leave may only be made with the written approval of the President.

- 3.1.2. The appointments of *Designated Senior Academic Administrators* are subject to the approval of the Board of Governors. The President shall provide advice and recommendations to the Board of Governors on the selection of *Designated Senior Academic Administrators*.
- 3.1.3. Advisory Committees are to be established at the call of the President to consider candidates for an appointment as a Designated Senior Academic Administrator and to advise the President on recommendations to the Board of Governors.
- **3.2. Exclusions:** This Policy does not apply to appointments for positions other than *Designated Senior Academic Administrators.*

4. Advisory Committees

4.1. President Convenes: For the selection of candidates for *Designated Senior Academic Administrators*, the President shall convene an *Advisory Committee* to consider and advise the President on the candidates before the President makes a recommendation to the Board of Governors ("*Advisory Committee*").

5. <u>Deputy Vice-Chancellors</u>

5.1. Currently, the President of the University holds the title of Deputy Vice-Chancellor for UBC Vancouver and the Vice-President, Academic and Research (UBC Okanagan) holds the title of Deputy Vice-Chancellor for UBC Okanagan. If, at some point in the future, it is determined that the position of Deputy Vice-Chancellor is to be held by a person other than the President in the case of UBC Vancouver or the Vice-President, Academic and Research (UBC Okanagan) in the case of UBC Okanagan, the President will convene an *Advisory Committee* with the membership set out in the table below. However, unless and until such a determination is made, the normal selection process for the President or for the Vice-President, Academic and Research (UBC Okanagan), as applicable, will be used and the balance of this section 5 shall be of no effect.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Senate may authorize a committee (such as, for example, the Nominating Committee) to conduct the process or to simply nominate the Senators from that Senate.
- **5.4.** Appointment Term: A Deputy Vice-Chancellor may be appointed for up to 6 years per term.

6. Academic Vice Presidents

6.1. The University Act refers to an "academic vice president" at each of UBC Okanagan and UBC Vancouver (the "Academic Vice Presidents"). At UBC Okanagan, the Academic Vice President carries the title "Vice President, Academic and Research". At UBC Vancouver, the Academic Vice President carries the title "Provost and Vice President Academic". For the selection of an Academic Vice President, the President will convene an Advisory Committee with the following membership:

8.2. Student Member Elections: For student members, the nominations and the elections are to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the Registrar. The Registrar may authorize a student society to conduct the nominations and/or elections processes on his or her behalf.

- **8.3. Senate Selections:** For Senators, the selection process is to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the relevant Senate. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Senate may authorize a committee (such as, for example, the Nominating Committee) to conduct the process or to simply nominate the Senators from that Senate.
- **8.4.** Council of Senates Selections: For members selected by the Council of Senates, the selection process is to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the Council of Senates. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Council of Senates may authorize a committee to conduct the process or may simply nominate the faculty members.
- **8.5.** Appointment Term: An Academic Associate Vice-President may be appointed for up to 6 years per term.

9. <u>Replacement of Advisory Committee Members</u>

- **9.1. Vacancy or Inability to Participate:** If a member of an *Advisory Committee* becomes unwilling or unable to serve as a member of the *Advisory Committee* before it has completed its work the President may appoint a replacement member in his/her discretion. While the replacement member may be any person whose participation is expected to contribute significantly to the *Advisory Committee*'s activities, the usual practice is for the President to replace a member from a stakeholder group with a person from that group. If the President does not appoint a replacement member, the *Advisory Committee* may complete its work notwithstanding the vacancy.
- **9.2.** Student Status: If a student member of an *Advisory Committee* ceases to be a student at the University but remains willing and able to continue to serve as a member of the *Advisory Committee*, the President may permit the student to continue to serve or may appoint a replacement student member at his or her discretion.
- 10. Customary Practices: In making appointments to an *Advisory Committee*, including replacement appointments under Section 9, the President will consider gender balance.
- 11. Procedures Not to Conflict: Provided that they are not in conflict with this Policy, the Procedures associated with this Policy may be created and amended in the same way as the Procedures associated with any other Policy passed by the Board of Governors.

Schedule to Policy # 18 Definitions and Other Interpretation Rules

1. Definitions

In Policy #18 – Appointment of Designated Senior Academic Administrators (Joint Senate and Board Policy), the following terms have the meaning defined below, and shall have the same meaning in any Procedures associated with that Policy:

- a. "Advisory Committee" means an advisory committee to the President as defined in section 4.1.
- b. "Designated Senior Academic Administrators" means the following:

- d. *"Academic Associate Vice-Presidents"* means the individuals designated as such by the President, from time to time, in the Procedures associated with this Policy.
- e. "Responsible Executive" means:
 - 3. individual(s) assigned by the President, from time to time, to be responsible for this Policy and any associated Procedures; and
 - 4. any sub-delegate of that assigned responsible individual(s) except to the extent that the power to delegate is specifically excluded in this Policy or in the appointment by the President.
- f. "Deans" means the Deans of UBC Okanagan Faculties, the Deans of UBC Vancouver Faculties, and the Deans of Dual-Campus Faculties, as those units are described in resolutions passed by the Board of Governors on June 3, 2005.
- g. "*Principals*" means the Principal of the College of Health Disciplines and the Principal of the College for Interdisciplinary Studies.

PROCEDURES

1. Responsible Executive

- 1.1. **Appointment**: The individual responsible for Policy #18 and these associated Procedures is the President.
- 1.2. **Sub-Delegation:** The Responsible Executive is not limited in sub-delegation of the duties hereunder but remains responsible for oversight.
- 2. Academic Associate Vice-Presidents: The following individuals are designated as Academic Associate Vice-Presidents:
 - 2.1. Deputy Provost (UBC Vancouver);
 - 2.2. Vice Provost and Associate Vice-President, Academic Affairs (UBC Vancouver);
 - 2.3. Vice Provost and Associate Vice-President, Academic Resources (UBC Vancouver);
 - 2.4. Provost (UBC Okanagan); and
 - 2.5. Associate Vice President, Research.
- 3. Remuneration: The form and amount of remuneration of *Designated Senior Academic Administrators* must be established and documented in writing at or before the effective date of the appointment.

4. Administrative Leaves

- 4.1. As part of the terms of an appointment, a *Designated Senior Academic Administrator* may be granted an administrative leave, to be taken at the conclusion of the appointment, provided however that any such grant of administrative leave as well as any remuneration and/or benefits to be received by the *Designated Senior Academic Administrator* during any such administrative leave must be documented in writing at or before the effective date of the appointment. Recognizing that administrative leave is intended to provide for a reasonable period of time for senior administrators who are returning the academic ranks to focus on their scholarly and professional activities and to re-integrate with their disciplines before they resume their regular duties as faculty members, administrator if he/she holds a tenured appointment and actually returns to active duty as a faculty member for at least one year immediately after the period of the administrative leave.
- 4.2. Time on administrative leave will not be included in years of service for the purpose of calculating study leave.
- 4.3. Any arrangements with respect to administrative leave for a *Designated Senior Academic Administrator* that that were established and documented in writing prior to May 1, 2008 will not be affected by these Procedures.
- 4.4. Any deviations from the provisions of these Procedures dealing with administrative leave may only be made with the written approval of the President.

Appointment of Registrar and Librarians (Joint Senate and Board Policy)

Background and Purpose:

Section 27(2)(f) of the University Act, R.S.B.C. 1996 c. 468 empowers the Board of Governors, with the approval of the UBC Okanagan Senate and the UBC Vancouver Senate, to establish procedures for the recommendation and selection of candidates for the Registrar and Librarians.

For extensions and acting appointments, please refer to Policy No.43 (Extension of Appointments for Registrar and Librarians).

1. Definitions and Interpretation Rules

1.1. A schedule to this Policy establishes the definitions of terms used in this Policy and any unique rules of interpretation that apply to this Policy.

2. <u>Scope</u>

2.1. General:

- 2.1.1. This Policy applies to all appointments of the *Registrar*, the *University Librarian*, and all other *Librarians*.
- 2.1.2. *Librarians* other than the *University Librarian* are appointed in accordance with the Collective Agreement between the University and the Faculty Association.

3. <u>Selection of Candidates</u>

- 3.1. For the selection of candidates for the *Registrar* and the *University Librarian*, the President shall convene an *Advisory Committee* as described in the Procedures and will consider the advice of the *Advisory Committee* in making a recommendation to the Board of Governors.
- 3.2. The President's recommendation, which may include recommended terms and conditions of any appointment, will be considered by the Board of Governors, which must approve such appointment and has the authority to establish the terms and conditions for any such appointment.

4. Procedures Not to Conflict:

4.1. Provided that they are not in conflict with this Policy, the Procedures associated with this Policy may be created and amended in the same way as the Procedures associated with any other Policy passed by the Board of Governors.

Schedule to Policy # 17 Definitions and Other Interpretation Rules

1. Definitions

In Policy # 17 - Appointment of Registrar and Librarians (Joint Senate and Board Policy), the following terms have the meaning defined below, and shall have the same meaning in any Procedures associated with that Policy:

- a. "Advisory Committee" means an advisory committee to the President as defined in Article 2 in the Procedures associated with this Policy.
- b. "Librarians" means the members of UBC's professional librarian staff.

- 3.2. The Co-Chairs of the *Advisory Committee* must consult with the President before confirming the composition of the *Advisory Committee*.
- 3.3. **Student Member Elections**: For student members, the nominations and the elections are to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the Co-Chairs. The Co-Chairs may authorize the incumbent Registrar or another person or entity, including a student society to conduct the nominations and/or elections processes on their behalf, notwithstanding the fact that the incumbent Registrar may be a candidate for appointment.
- 3.4. Senate Selections: For a Senate selection, the selection process is to be conducted in accordance with procedures satisfactory to the relevant Senate. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Senate may authorize a committee (such as, for example, the Nominating Committee) to conduct the process or to simply make the selection.
- 3.5. Appointment Term: The Registrar may be appointed for up to 6 years per term.
- 4. Replacement of Advisory Committee Members
 - 4.1. Vacancy or Inability to Participate: If a member of an Advisory Committee becomes unwilling or unable to serve as a member of the Advisory Committee before it has completed its work, the Chair or Co-Chairs, as applicable, in consultation with the President, may appoint a replacement member. While the replacement member may be any person whose participation is expected to contribute significantly to the Advisory Committee's activities, the usual practice is for the replacement member to be from the same stakeholder group as the person being replaced.
 - 4.2. Student Status: If a student member of an *Advisory Committee* ceases to be a student at the University but remains willing and able to continue to serve as a member of the *Advisory Committee*, the Chair or Co-Chairs, as applicable, in consultation with the President and the relevant student group, may permit the student to continue to serve or may appoint a replacement student member. Any such replacement must meet the same

eligibility requirements as the student who is being replaced. For example, if the student being replaced is a student selected from the students registered at UBC Okanagan, the replacement student will be appointed from the students registered at UBC Okanagan.

4.3. If a replacement member is not appointed, the *Advisory Committee* may complete its work notwithstanding the vacancy.

5. Customary Practices

5.1. In making appointments to an *Advisory Committee*, including replacement appointments under Article 4 of these Procedures, the President will endeavour to provide for a diverse and balanced *Advisory Committee*.

6. Procedure for Advisory Committee

- 6.1. The Chair or Co-Chairs of the *Advisory Committee* will be responsible for calling meetings.
- 6.2. Meetings may be held face-to-face, via telephone conference, video conference or any means determined by the Chair or Co-Chairs of the *Advisory Committee*, as applicable.
- 6.3. The quorum required to transact business at meetings will be a majority of the members of the *Advisory Committee* unless otherwise determined by the Chair or Co-Chairs, as applicable.

7. <u>Remuneration</u>

7.1. The form and amount of remuneration of the *Registrar* and the *University Librarian* must be established and documented in writing at or before the effective date of the appointment.

8. Administrative Leaves

- 8.1. As part of the terms of an appointment, the University Librarian and the Registrar may be granted an administrative leave, to be taken at the conclusion of the appointment, provided however that any such grant of administrative leave as well as any remuneration and/or benefits to be received by the University Librarian or the Registrar during any such administrative leave must be documented in writing at or before the effective date of the appointment. Recognizing that administrative leave is intended to provide for a reasonable period of time for senior administrators who are returning the academic ranks to focus on their scholarly and professional activities and to re-integrate with their disciplines before they resume their regular duties as faculty members or Librarians, administrative leave will only be granted to the University Librarian and the Registrar if he or she holds, in the case of the University Librarian, a confirmed appointment, and in the case of the Registrar, a tenured appointment, and they actually return to active duty as a faculty member or a Librarian for at least one year immediately after the period of the administrative leave.
- 8.2. If an administrative leave is granted, time served as a *Registrar* or *University Librarian* and time taken on administrative leave will not be included in years of service for the purpose of calculating study leave.
- 8.3. During the period of administrative leave, the faculty member continues to be a full-time employee of the University, and is required to comply with the University's policies and procedures.

- 8.4. Any arrangements with respect to administrative leave that that were established and documented in writing prior to February 1, 2008 will not be affected by these Procedures.
- 8.5. Any deviations from the provisions of these Procedures dealing with administrative leave may only be made with the written approval of the President.

1. Definitions and Interpretation Rules

1.1. A schedule to this Policy establishes the definitions of terms used in this Policy and any unique rules of interpretation that apply to this Policy.

2. <u>Scope</u>

- 2.1. This Policy applies to all appointments of Designated Senior Academic Administrators.
- 2.2. Currently, the President of the University holds the title of Deputy Vice-Chancellor for UBC Vancouver and the Vice-President, Academic and Research (UBC Okanagan) holds the title of Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Principal for UBC Okanagan. If at some point in the future, it is determined that the position of Deputy Vice-Chancellor is to be held by a person other than the President in the case of UBC Vancouver or the Vice-President, Academic and Research (UBC Okanagan) in the case of UBC Okanagan, the process for dealing with appointments for the Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Principal (UBC Okanagan) or the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (UBC Vancouver) as set out in this Policy and any associated Procedures will apply. However, unless and until such a determination is made, the normal selection process for the President or for the Vice-President, Academic and Research (UBC Okanagan), as applicable, will be applied.

3. <u>Selection of Candidates</u>

- 3.1. For the selection of candidates for *Designated Senior Academic Administrators*, the President shall convene an *Advisory Committee* as described in the Procedures and will consider the advice of the *Advisory Committee* in making a recommendation to the Board of Governors.
- 3.2. The President's recommendation, which may include recommended terms and conditions of the appointment, will be considered by the Board of Governors which must approve the appointment and has the authority to establish the terms and conditions for any such appointment.

4. Procedures Not to Conflict:

4.1. Provided that they are not in conflict with this Policy, the Procedures associated with this Policy may be created and amended in the same way as the Procedures associated with any other Policy passed by the Board of Governors.

Schedule to Policy #18 Definitions and Other Interpretation Rules

1. Definitions

In Policy #18 – Appointment of Designated Senior Academic Administrators (Joint Senate and Board Policy), the following terms have the meaning defined below, and shall have the same meaning in any Procedures associated with that Policy:

- a. "Academic Associate Vice-Presidents" means the positions designated as such by the President, from time to time, in the Procedures associated with this Policy.

 - 4. Vice President, Research and International; and
 - 5. Academic Associate Vice-Presidents.
- f. "Dual-Campus Faculty" has the same meaning attributed to it in resolutions passed by the Board of Governors on June 3, 2005. [Note: As at July 1, 2005, the sole Dual-Campus Faculty was the Faculty of Applied Science.]
- g. "Responsible Executive" means:
 - 1. individual(s) assigned by the President, from time to time, to be responsible for this Policy and any associated Procedures; and
 - 2. any sub-delegate of that assigned responsible individual(s) except to the extent that the power to delegate is specifically excluded in this Policy or in the appointment by the President.
- h. "Principals" means:
 - 1. the Principal of the College of Health Disciplines; and
 - 2. the Principal of the College for Interdisciplinary Studies.
- i. *"UBC Okanagan Faculty"* has the same meaning attributed to the term "Faculty of UBC Okanagan" in resolutions passed by the Board of Governors on June 3, 2005. [Note: as at July 1, 2005, the UBC Okanagan Faculties were the Faculty of Arts and Sciences (now known as the Irving K. Barber School of Arts and Sciences), the Faculty of Creative and Critical Studies, the Faculty of Education, the Faculty of Health and Social Development, and the Faculty of Management.]

j. *"UBC Vancouver Faculty"* has the same meaning attributed to the term "Faculty of UBC Vancouver" in resolutions passed by the Board of Governors on June 3, 2005. [Note: as at July 1, 2005, the UBC Vancouver Faculties were the Faculty of Arts, the Faculty of Commerce and Business Administration (now known as the Sauder School of Business), the Faculty of Dentistry, the Faculty of Education, the Faculty of Forestry, the Faculty of Graduate Studies, the Faculty of Land and Food Systems, the Faculty of Law, the Faculty of Medicine, the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, and the Faculty of Science].

The University of British Columbia Students Union Okanagan and Students of UBC have planned activities for the day of February 1st 2012 to raise public awareness about the role of post secondary education and to pressure governments to reinvest in affordable, high-quality public education. The motion being put forth below seeks the approval of the Okanagan Senate to grant students a day of academic amnesty as has been done in the past by Senates at other Canadian universities¹:

Motion: that the UBC Okanagan Senate provide academic amnesty for those students who wish to participate in campus events as part of the National Day of Action on Wednesday, February 1, 2012 and that professors make flexible alternate arrangements, where academically possible, including re-scheduling examinations and the deadlines for submission of assignments, and provide reasonable access to materials covered during lectures for students who are absent from classes on February 1st, 2012 so that they may freely participate in the Day of Action with no fear of academic repercussions.
